# Principal's Message

Last week our Student Representative Council and School Captains were inducted into their positions. I was asked to give a short speech on leadership. During the speech I pledged to listen to the SRC and explain to the members of the council why decisions are made where appropriate. Obviously some decisions have a degree of confidentiality attached to them so it would be inappropriate for me to discuss but I will always be approachable. I believe a Principal should listen to the students as they are why the school exists. Seems common sense to me! Also in this speech I spoke about how proud I was of the amount of students who put their name forward for positions. The world is full of could haves and should haves but at times there are too few people that actually put their hands up to do the work. I want to encourage a culture in the school where students have the confidence to put themselves forward and risk possible failure. I was particularly pleased to see the range of students elected by their peers to serve on the SRC. This indicates to me that inclusion, a fundamental value of Public Education is a feature of your school.

I am very pleased to announce the school enrolled six new students last week and one the previous week. This means the school has eleven more students than this time last year. These students were not expected and very welcome. I have also received genuine enquiries from the families of an additional six primary school students.

Considering the variety of choices families have I am very pleased that they have chosen Trundle Central School. However, I would love more students to experience the opportunities Trundle Central School provides so continue to promote your school and this wonderful town.

On assembly last week I spoke about the increase in enrolments and explained to the students that they positively promote the school and should be congratulated. Parents should also be congratulated on the standard of uniform and presentation of their children. However, we can always do better so staff

and I will continue to encourage students to wear correct uniform. I remind parents that students will not represent the school or attend extra-curricular activities unless they are wearing full school uniform or the activity has a Principal approved exemption from uniform. I realise at times families struggle, so if you are having difficulty providing the correct uniform, please contact the school as we have some limited capacity to help.

I also spoke to students informing them that the minister and I came up to the school on the weekend to clean the courtyard area of the playground and the front of the school. Your school is blessed with cleaners who have a genuine respect for the school and town but over the break there had been a build-up of dirt and leaves especially around eating areas. Students should understand I expect the school to look as good as possible within our physical and financial capacity. If this involves me cleaning or gardening, that is what will happen and I would appreciate their support by respecting the school. The vast majority of students understand the need to protect the school for future generations and I thank them for their support. However, getting better is always the goal.

In line with this philosophy we have allocated financial resources towards continued school improvements. This money needs to be supplemented with grant money to make a real difference but hopefully the community will see real positive changes to the school environment. Currently we are applying for a grant to install a sun and weather shelter across the footpath for bus students. I often apply for grants with only limited success. My stars this week said a financial boost is expected in the near future from a surprising source. So it is either a successful grant application or a remorseful dog owner paying for the chooks that were killed. I know someone out in the community may suspect their dog had a good meal of rather mature chicken. If your dog gets excited when the Kentucky Fried Chicken commercials come on, little Rover may have some explaining to do.

The school has received a generous gift of sheep from the Wykes family. We are currently in the process of repairing our fences to try to make these animals as safe as possible. I believe it is essential that we have larger animals for our agricultural program to increase the scope of activities students can experience. The introduction of these animals make it even more important that the community control their dogs. Any dog found in school grounds will be reported to the

Ranger or Police if we cannot contact the owner immediately. I cannot take the risk of children being injured or animals being killed. It is very simple, owning a dog is a privilege but with privilege comes responsibility.

The Police Paddock has been rotary hoed ready for our first crop of vegetables. What we need now is rain and horse manure. If you have some horse manure you can donate to the school please contact us. Organising the rain is in the control of a much higher authority.

I believe students should be able to experience as many extra-curricular activities as possible. Last week the NRL Development Officer attended the school and some students travelled to Narromine for swimming. In the near future a visiting artist will attend our school. Encouraging these types of events is costly financially and in terms of staffing. The school has no choice to charge families to try and recover some of the costs associated with extra-curricular activities. Please support your school in paying for activities by the due date.

Last week the school practiced our lock down procedures. It is mandatory for schools to practice lock down and evacuation drills regularly. As the standard procedure for fire drills is to remove students to a safe place, evacuation drills cover this area. I will continue these drills until I am sure your school is the safest it can possibly be for students and staff. For the drill last week I deliberately sounded the alarm when students were in the playground as this may be the case during a real emergency. Trundle is a very safe place and as such the possibility of a genuine reason for a lock down is small. However, I am not willing to take the risk. Who would possibly want me too with their children?

Glen McGrath and Brett Lee have made the news this week. When I viewed the photos of their game hunting, especially the dead elephant I was a little shocked as this is not my world and never has been. However, what I am more disappointed about is the continual calls for the cricketers to apologise to the Australian people. Have we become this sensitive and precious as a society that when somebody does something some people do not agree with the whole collective nation deserves an apology? Both these men were long time servants of the game and championed many great causes for the collective good of the nation. Role models are best found at home. However, boys in particular often look to sporting people for these role models. I am not saying cover up poor behaviour, crimes or corruption

but reducing the role models for children because of legal but controversial behaviour cannot be positive for anyone.

Many of our regular casuals have been employed in other schools or been appointed to permanent positions. This is an indication of the quality support and professional development they receive at Trundle Central School. 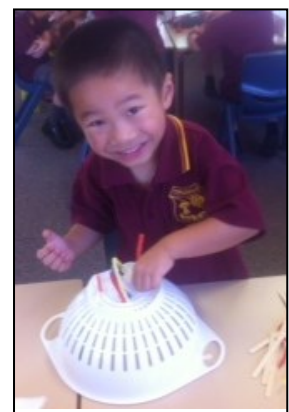

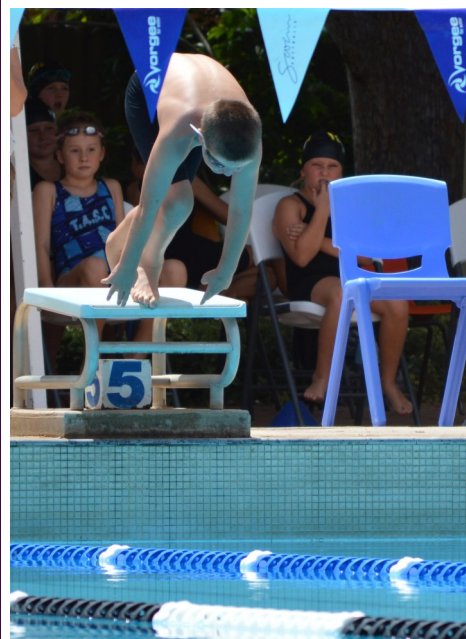
