Principal's Message

This week is another one packed with activities for the students of Trundle Central School. Today secondary golf at Orange and English HSC study day at Peak Hill, Wednesday 4t's sport at Trangie, Thursday HSC hospitality and a gala day at Peak Hill. Friday NRL coaching sessions, Gobondery / Narraf cricket and softball and the week culminates with the Continental. This week is yet another example of the range of experiences available at your local public school.

The school community should never forget that these activities for your children can only occur because of the goodwill of staff and on occasion parents. It is not mandatory for staff to become involved in extra-curricular activities such as sport and they certainly do not get paid extra for giving up their own time to allow your children to attend excursions. I wonder sometimes if community members who have only experienced Trundle Central School believe the level of support and commitment to your children by the staff is the norm. I can assure you it is not. Staff at this school go well beyond what I have seen in other schools to allow your children to experience extra-curricular activities.

Last Tuesday I attended the annual general meeting of the P&C. This group is yet another example of people displaying commitment and dedication to the students of Trundle Central School. Many P&C groups across the state are dysfunctional in terms of membership and finances. Others are dominated by groups of people with a political agenda or believe the P&C is a forum to make personal comments against staff with a degree of immunity. Thankfully your P&C works to benefit all children at the school and is very supportive of what we are trying to achieve at Trundle Central School. I look forward to continuing the productive working relationship with the new P&C executive (especially their bank account) and thank the previous team for their

hard work and dedication to the school.

Friday last week was the last day of Mrs Leanne Budd. Mrs Budd was completing a practicum placement with us in the Kinder 1/2 classroom. Mrs Budd displayed all the qualities needed to become a very good teacher. One very noticeable aspect of her teaching was her obvious love for children. I wish her well in her studies and future career. She is very welcome to return to Trundle Central School in the future.

As mentioned previously our computer server is next in the region for an upgrade. This hopefully will solve the problems in our existing computer lab by increasing the speed of data flow. In consultation with other school executive I have decided to use school money to supplement the Departmental roll out. Recently we spent 10,000 dollars on improving our video conferencing facilities and purchased a 3D printer. The school is now planning to further improve student access to technology by purchasing top of the line computers capable of producing the highest quality graphics and establish an additional small computer lab. These computers will allow students access to a whole new aspect of learning with the aide of technology. I am especially looking forward to seeing what our students can produce in the creative arts area using this technology. Some of our classrooms have limited access to wireless internet and interactive white boards need upgrading. These areas are also targeted for improvement.

The school is also looking at additional shade covering in the playground. The negative effects of prolonged exposure to the sun are well documented so I feel I have a moral as well as legal obligation to try and continually improve the level of sun protection. In addition I am looking at our level of rainwater storage and ability to irrigate our ovals and agricultural plot. All these improvements to the school take time and I am constantly looking for funding opportunities to help the school. I heard a comment recently that the school looks the best it has ever looked. This type of comment is nice to hear but people who know me well realise that I am not happy with just making an existing aspect of the school better. I want this school to have

the best facilities, teaching programs and pastoral care that we can possibly provide for your children. This means continually trying to improve. The frustrating aspect for me is the unavoidable time lag between a good idea and seeing something tangible in the school.

Two new programs that will run in the primary section of the school next term are The FRIENDS AND DRUMBEAT programs. These programs are provided by Parkes Family Support and run for 10 weeks. Both these programs are pastoral care programs designed to encourage students to make better choices and gain self-esteem. These programs are examples of our commitment to educate children to be good citizens as well as our continual focus on literacy and numeracy development.

If you have a child in years 3, 5, 7 or 9 you should receive a note explaining NAPLAN. Please take some time to read the note. Exemptions are available to students with disabilities or conditions that stop them being able to complete the exam. I was asked by a Yr. 9 student if parents can write letters to exempt their children. All exemptions are a negotiation process between the school and family. Sorry, to this student you cannot have an exemption because you do not want to do it. I ask students to do their best in these exams but remember that all tests judge your ability to answer the questions not your worth as a person.

Unfortunately last week we had two High School students who became involved in a physical fight. I believe it is important that I acknowledge this as I have found the Trundle / Bogan Gate Telegraph tends to get the story completely wrong or exaggerate the truth considerably. The truth is often the first casualty in a good story. On occasions young people become involved in fights so it is important not to over react with excessive punishment or go the other way and give this form of behaviour any form of acceptance or credibility. As I have clearly stated before I will not accept any form of physical violence in this school. Suspension will occur and they will be long suspensions if warranted. The disappointing aspect of most fights, as with this incident, it is factors outside of the school that have led to the situation occurring not how students are performing at this school. Please

be aware of my policy (Departmental policy) on students fighting and talk to your children about alternatives to this extremely unacceptable behaviour.

Thank you to the many people who paid their subject fees last week. This indicates to me the quality of the people whose children attend this school. Unfortunately, there are still some people who believe it is alright for others to subsidise their children. As I mentioned previously payment plans are available by simply contacting the school. I will always respect people's privacy when contacted asking for a payment plan or an extension, so if you need help please ask.

I will need to advertise wider for a guitar teacher as we did not receive any suitable applicants locally. If any person is aware of a person who may be interested please contact me at the school.

Bullying – No Way



At our school we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone. Sometimes, it can be difficult for parents or carers to know what to do when their child talks to them about bullying. You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens.

Stopping bullying involves everyone.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen** calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need to: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.
- 2. Reassure** your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask** your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. Visit** www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. Contact** the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's teacher and, if you need to, ask to talk with the principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. Check in regularly** with your child. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.
