Principal's Message

Another busy week has started at Trundle Central School. Monday, Net Waste activities for primary, Tuesday, primary enrichment, Wednesday, dental van, Thursday, secondary welfare BBQ, homework club and Friday, school cross country. This is a busy week but the school calendar indicates the number of activities is only going to increase both in terms of academic challenge and extra-curricular activities.

ANZAC Day is growing in significance for young people. This is never as evident than the fantastic attendance at the march by students of this school. As Principal I naturally have days where I question the direction, behaviour and motivation of some students. However, the attendance and behaviour at ANZAC services reminded me again of the quality of the young people at this school. I thank those who attended for giving me a much needed boost. I often reflect on why ANZAC Day is now stronger than ever after so many years. The conclusions I gain are young people are still looking for the examples of commitment, bravery and devotion to country over the needs of the individual. This is why I believe this school should continue to explicitly teach the values that hold together our society. A special thanks to the Whiley family for laying a wreath on behalf of the school at the *Bogan Gate Dawn Service*.

Year 12 reports have been posted. I have read all reports and in general I am happy with student progress. The next two terms are vital in terms of students displaying the maturity to place their study above other distractions. I believe balance is the key. Students still need a life but when other activities or behaviours start to reduce their long term potential, serious self-reflection is required. I hope senior students realise that I will give them every opportunity to succeed but when they stop making a genuine effort in class, fail to complete tasks or their behaviour restricts others from learning, they will be asked to leave the school. There is no room for negotiation on this point. Thankfully, our senior students are generally working well but I feel it is important to remind parents and students of my stance on this matter.

Departmental staffing is still in the process of replacing Miss Alyssa Coursey. I have tried to increase the speed of this replacement but we are subject to Departmental

processes and time lines. The Departmental direction is to move towards giving schools more local autonomy in terms of school staffing but at this stage we still need to follow the existing procedures. This could mean that a teacher is appointed to the position with the school having limited input in the process. Whatever, the outcome of these processes, Trundle Central School will continue to progress and thrive because we have the best foundation, good quality happy children and a cohesive community. Mrs Berry has generously said she will stay for an additional two weeks. Mrs Suellen Taylor has extended her leave. This will mean the current primary staff arrangements will continue.

I have been applying to school staffing to allow some innovation in the way our school is staffed and resources allocated. This is a frustrating and difficult process at times. However, if the process is the rubber tree, meet the ant. I will continue to pursue avenues for staffing and funding to help your school to continue to improve. This can involve some school and personal risk because thinking outside the square increases the possibility of failure. If we are scared of possible failure we close our minds to possible positive change.

Recently, a police officer from another country town was telling me about primary aged children addicted to the drug ice in her town. The supply and addictive nature of this drug is breaking down family and social structures within this town. When I hear of these things I automatically think of the massive waste of potential in these children and the absolute human trash who are profiting by supplying drugs to children. Also, this week I overheard a conversation where a person was questioning how people could possibly live in a small town like Trundle because there is nothing to do. I think the opposite. Trundle has some individuals whose lifestyle is questionable and we are not immune to society's social issues but in general we have a safe cohesive community where people still care. I hope people realise this and promote the gifts of living in Trundle wherever they go because we will continue to survive if new families move to the district.

Our staff development day focused on the new school plan 2015-2017 and increasing the staff awareness of mental health issues in school aged children. In brief the three strategic directions for the school are:

- Developing whole school community organisational practices that enable all students to be highly engaged in school, emotionally aware and technologically competent.
- Developing consistent high quality educational

practices and student achievement driven by assessment and SMART data evidence in line with the Australian Curriculum in Literacy and Numeracy.

- Embedding quality leadership and organisational practices to support leadership design, learning alliances, organisational innovation and leadership sustainability.

These strategic directions are in line with the philosophy of providing a comprehensive holistic education for all students. The whole document can be viewed on our website.

The second part of the day was taking part in an information session delivered by Ms Dianne Gill, an adolescent mental health nurse. I prefer people who are currently working in the field over pure academics because strategies have to be practical rather than theories. Educating staff is the first and vital step to help students experiencing short or long term difficulties feel better.

Last week we welcomed Jack Milligan into Kindergarten. This means we now have eight Kindergarten students, a fantastic vote of confidence from the community in their local school. I also have a firm expression of interest from a family with two children. This would take our numbers to 61 in the primary section of the school. We still have plenty of room and the biggest welcome mat of any school in New South Wales so continue to encourage people to move to Trundle. As I have stated before, new people into town has an enormous multiplier affect both in terms of money and innovation.

Providing alternative curriculum is a core goal of the school and public education. This is why our secondary interest electives were introduced and will continue this term. Students should always be aware that these electives only operate because teaching staff are willing to provide alternative curriculum outside their usual subject areas. Parents are reminded that these electives do not reduce time spent on core curriculum. Indeed, your school allocates well above indicative hours on English, Mathematics and Science. These electives cause an additional financial burden on the school so I encourage students to take full advantage of the opportunity.

The work skills program has been operating this year utilising limited school resources. The school has been successful in being awarded \$1700 to continue this program. The program allows students who are looking for a trade to develop their basic work readiness skills.

I believe this is vitally important as I am just as proud of a student who enters a trade as one who is successful in the HSC. This money will be put towards materials to build a new enclosure for our chickens (dog proof) and other improvements to our grounds. I am sure these students will benefit from the program and hope we can secure funding for it to continue. They were avoiding the crow bar like a black snake when I saw them last week so they are already showing essential knowledge for future success.

Primary enrichment involves project based learning. This method of teaching involves students working for an extended period of time to answer a complex question, problem or challenge. The key to this type of approach is students are not given the information they need to actively seek out to find solutions and answers. The first group is a group of primary boys. They will start their challenge Tuesday afternoon.

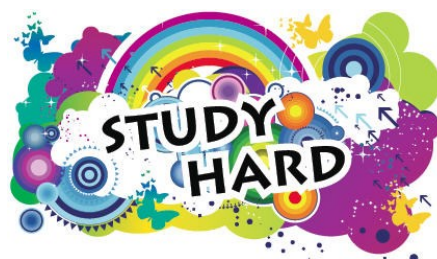

10 TIPS TO IMPROVE YOUR

Body Language



- 1. SMILE! ☺**
- 2. Keep an open space before your upper torso.** *E.g., don't fold your arms, hug your bag, or put things on your lap.*
- 3. Have eye contact.** *Important to establish connection.*
- 4. Be comfortable in your space.** *Don't fidget, don't squirm, or don't lose yourself in your body.*
- 5. (For ladies) When resting on your hand, keep the insides of your hand faced outwards.** *This makes you appear more open.*
- 6. Minimize movement that distracts.** *Don't finger drum, nail bite, skin peel, or scab pick.*
- 7. Slow down your pace.** *(for fast talkers). Move slowly if you have to adjust your position.*
- 8. Be inclusive in your actions.** *E.g., reduce the physical distance between you and the other person, smile, maintain eye contact, and make occasional gestures towards the other person.*
- 9. Be open with your emotions.** *If you are sad, happy, or surprised, show that on your face.*
- 10. Pace yourself to match the other person.** *At the end of the day, everyone is different. Assess each person individually and adopt the body language that will help you best connect with him/her.*



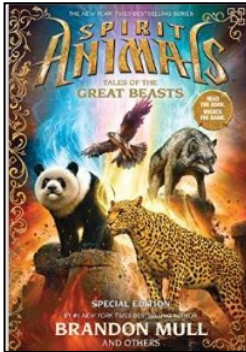

Lay-by your Season Ticket now for Parkes Shire Swimming Pools

Season tickets for the 2015/16 pool season are now available to lay-by at Parkes Shire Council. Season ticket lay-bys are available for all the pools in the Parkes Shire including Parkes, Peak Hill, Trundle, and Tullamore. Lay-by's can be made at Council's Administration Centre or by contacting Council on 6861 2333.

"Season Ticket Lay-bys are available now, with the pool season starting in early November, there are six months to pay off the season tickets. For a family season ticket at the Parkes pool it is only \$13 a week. For a family season ticket in the smaller townships it is \$10 a week," Parkes Shire Council General Manager Kent Boyd said.

With the pool season due to start on the 26th September in Parkes and 7th November in the Shire's smaller townships, the time is right to lay-by pool season tickets and take advantage of the long payment period.

Residents who are occasional users of the pool can also take advantage of prepaid admission tickets. Books of ten (10) and twenty (20) admission tickets are available to purchase at Council's Administration Centre and represent a saving of 0.30c and 0.50c respectively compared to a single adult pool admission.
