# Principal's Message

This week is Harmony Day on Wednesday. Harmony Day celebrates cultural diversity and our tolerant society that is becoming increasingly rare in the world. On Friday two primary teams will attend the Gobondery/ NARRAF sports day. This is a very big commitment from primary teachers and an indication of the excellent effort and behaviour of students this year. Our teachers are willing to go beyond their job descriptions because they are confident that students will display excellent behaviour and maintain the required effort. Well done to primary students and staff. One of the many great features of this outstanding school is when students leave the bus after an excursion they always thank their teachers and the driver. This indicates that the partnership between parents and the school is working well in terms of modelling and encouraging students to display respect, excellence and care our school values.

It is extremely common that staff and parents of other schools comment on the positive attitude and behaviour that our students display when attending inter-school events. The quality of our students is because of the continued effort and dedication of staff and the support of families. The attitude I want to instil in students is, *no person has the right to stop others from learning*. It is a fundamental human right, the ability to access education. If a student's behaviour is consistently stopping others from learning in class they will be dealt with using the school welfare and discipline systems. These systems are based on the principles of natural justice and feature a heavy emphasis on positive reinforcement. Students can eventually however, in extreme cases be suspended or expelled under Departmental Policy and the school code. I do not enjoy utilising or take lightly suspension or expulsion of students but I will very willingly to do so if I feel it is necessary. Our discipline and welfare systems are not discriminatory in any way. Indeed, it is a pure form of egalitarianism as every child has access to a fundamental human right, the ability to access education. I still laugh when parents one hundred percent believe the story relayed to them from their children or use semantics such as disputing the time of a statement as a desperate form of defence. Developmentally children should be stretching the truth and behavioural boundaries as this is how they

determine their place in the world. The trick is to match their version of the truth to the actual truth.

In fact Australian computer engineers are developing the most ground breaking invention for parents. It is called the virtual teenager. This will eventually replace the need for actual teenagers. This electronically generated image when it stares into your fridge actually finds something relatively healthy they want to eat. It realises that placing the empty container back into the fridge does not mean the fridge fairies will fill it. Electronic teenager searches through the groceries like a lion attacking its prey of the great plains of Africa but then actually puts them away as well. Vaccinations are not needed to enter their room and they realise it is actually your room. The male virtual version showers regularly without a court order. Virtual teenager also has a socket to recharge your internet account and it promptly leaves your house after school finishes in Year 12 but out of respect for your hard work over the years regularly places money in your account. The software for this virtual teenager is complex and expensive but is coming. Until this happens, we will have to manage/struggle as best we can.

I am concerned about students being late for school. Some students have already missed a day of school this term when you add all the times late. This is not acceptable from a learning perspective but also from a child welfare point of view. Please encourage your children to be on time for school.

Bullying is a problem across all areas of society. Sometimes it is subtle like a comment or restricting information or resources. Other times it is overt such as physical or emotional violence. Bullying is not restricted socio-economically or geographically. It occurs in the workplace, families and in sport. The goal of one hundred percent elimination of bullying is aspirational but unfortunately not really achievable because some people are bullies by nature or nurture and indeed in some situations especially in the workplace some bullies are promoted because of their ability to push others down. This school has many examples of students coming to our school after bullying incidences elsewhere and flourishing in our caring personal environment. We are not perfect but when we can detect it and prove it, do not tolerate bullying. However, we should not also be too quick to automatically label a disagreement between two students as bullying. Bullying is targeted and systematic and designed to hurt. Recently I had a young student describe an incident as bullying. When questioned it was because another student did not want to play her game. This is another student exercising her right not to play, not bullying. However, this student used the



term because it has become the easiest label to use and emotive.

Last week the school received very good news. The ageing verandas around the school are being restored. These verandas have had many feet walk over them in the past and with this work, they should be good for many years to come. In addition, our netball/tennis court is starting, the week after the short Easter break. Unfortunately, not all pledged money was received by the school before the start date which is disappointing but I am trusting this is an administration error rather than a broken promise. An addition to the design of this court is telescopic netball posts. This will allow students of all ages to enjoy a game. The construction of this court compliments our gym, sensory gym and new cricket nets as far as improvement in sporting facilities. Mrs Morgan and I started talking about the addition of this court to the school three years ago. What is essentially a slab of concrete with lines quickly took on the complexity of the pyramids of Giza when I wanted the facilities to be open to the community with conditions. We always need to remember that the government is like the old *pet shampoo* ad. It will happen but just not overnight and I am determined that students at this school have all the facilities they deserve so I am very willing to keep fighting for this school. Another project to commence shortly after Easter is the replacement of the library roof. The broken tiles from the existing roof will be landfill so if somebody could use them to place in a wash out (yes it does rain) or crushed to place in a driveway or similar are welcome to the tiles.

As people will remember, last winter we had unusually heavy frosts. This resulted in the loss of plants we purchased to brighten the area near the air conditioners. Recently I approached Bunnings, Forbes for replacement plants and they have agreed to replace the plants and also provide the labour. This follows Bunnings establishment of gardens last year. Obviously water is a continuing problem with the school already modifying our watering schedule to reduce the strain on the dam. However, I have confidence that on one tomorrow it will rain so I am going ahead with the establishment of these gardens. In addition, I think it is very important in times of drought that some parts of the community still are green. It gives us hope and is calming in a sort of way.

Last week I approached CleanTeQ and North Parkes mines to support our school. I am pleased that Clean TeQ has agreed to financially contribute to the students of this school. They will match dollar for dollar any fundraising the school does this year up to a value of 2000 dollars. This will allow the cost of our activities

to be reduced allowing a broader range of students to take part in extra curricula activities. I am sure North Parkes Mines who have been great supporters of this school will also maintain their relationship. Any untargeted money received at the school is evenly spread across all students in terms of reducing the cost of activities. I believe families who are in a financial position to pay for these activities or save to allow their children to attend should not be disadvantaged.

Thank you to John from the former Clarke's garage for a donation of keys to our small motors program. Also, Greg Lowe and Brett Ridges for the donation of four-wheelers for the students to practice on. In some exciting news, the school has received a donation of a complete running car from Kerry Plowman. Students will remove the motor from this car and build a cradle to allow them to learn the basics of a larger motor. This is an exciting addition to the program. Last week the students had a victory over the instructors. Mr Grady and I tried to trace an electrical fault in a ride on motor with no success. Nick Williams and Will Longhurst had that mower purring like the West Tigers at the moment within twenty minutes. Young eyes and enthusiasm beat the old guys.



The school last year lost the dental van that has been a service to Trundle for many years. I do not believe this was acceptable but had limited success in convincing people in health that matter. To fill this void I have asked in partnership with St Patrick's, *Smiles on Site* to service the school late next term. This is a free service to families who qualify for the Medicare CDBS program. This is the majority of our families. Those who do not qualify will still receive the free check-up but referrals will be given to local dentists if work is needed. The van will remain in Trundle for a few days after the school visits to service the local community. This is commonwealth-funded service. I will be sending information home when dates are confirmed.

In yet more exciting news the Department of Education has selected our school to take part in a video production to promote country education. This is an amazing vote of confidence for our school. This will take place late this term.

Thank you to Parramatta Rugby league Club. I was looking for an extension exercise for Primary mathematics. A score that big will allow us to look at a number of mathematics problems. Especially being able to calculate the value added for exceeding the salary cap. The ability to determine negative numbers is an important skill in mathematics.
