Principal's Message

This week Year 7 injections Wednesday and the shooting of the promotional video highlighting Public Education and Rural Schools commences on Wednesday and concludes Thursday. Also this week the replacement of the library roof continues and finally the construction of our netball/tennis court starts.

Projects at the school and in the town such as the construction of the new teacher housing residences have a significant economic multiplier effect as workers stay and eat locally. Some might even enjoy a refreshing drink at the club or pub. I am told both venues serve an excellent product. This type of economic injection into the town is particularly important as unfortunately it looks like a tough year for the agricultural sector. One of my father's favourite sayings was Jesus Christ was a fisherman he definitely was too smart to be a farmer. Just a tip for students do not argue his occupation with your scripture teacher, experience tells me you will not win that argument. Thanks dad, one of your best sucker passes. I believe the town needs to embrace new opportunities and support those few people that are willing to risk possible failure, public criticism or drowning in the seemingly endless red and green tape to seek new facilities and opportunities in the town. I believe Trundle is at a defining juncture in the future of this town. We can adopt a deficit mentality and accept the things we do not have or stand up and thrive through advocating to governments and private employers to develop employment, facilities and housing in this town. Having the potholes fixed is important but ultimately progress is about having the vision to plan for the future survival of the town. People will come to live where there are jobs. We are now located in a marginal seat, a rare opportunity for our town.

The new teacher housing is particularly good news because all teachers at this school have expressed a strong desire to live locally. Teachers who live locally can contribute more economically and culturally to the town where they work rather than take the money out of town. This new accommodation will allow at least some of our new teachers the option of living locally but we still need more housing. Additional teacher

housing will also free up rental properties for new residents to the town. Just last Friday I had a family wanting to move to town approach me trying to find suitable accommodation. I could not even offer a short term solution. If you have a three bedroom house in good condition please contact the school.

On Sunday a note was left at my house from a student who moved from this school/town because the family relocated. Contained in the note was a passionate desire to move back to this school because of the supportive caring educational and social environment staff and students create and maintain. This was pleasing to hear but also a little frustrating as it is difficult to spread this message in a world where the quality of a school is often judged by statistics or because it promotes elitism or a religious doctrine rather than in the ability of a school to allow all students regardless of their academic ability or socio-economic status to feel welcome, safe and to achieve. The grass appears greener on the other side of the fence but often after we jump we realise that from a distance a mass of weeds is also green. The school has lost students recently creating a possibility that for the first time in four years we will actually have less students at the end of the year than we commenced. However, my positive side knows that the mini bus containing a family of highly talented students desperate to enrol in public education is coming. Hopefully before the end of the year. I will settle for a station wagon until the mini bus arrives.

The discipline system in a school needs to be a balance between punishment when necessary and positive reinforcement. The time when students could be forced into positive behaviour through sanctions or corporal punishment is long gone. When I went to school if one strike with the cane did not work six certainly would. Ironically, students got six strikes with a large stick for violence. Indeed, I reinforce to new teachers that you cannot out agro students because many students come from domestic circumstances that teaches them to be experts in aggression because that is all they see. Building relationships is the key because when a student feels accepted and supported they give more credibility to the teacher and the school which is the key to a cooperative learning partnership. I feel this school achieves this because even when our students are in situations such as excursions or sporting events where there is reduced direct supervision they still maintain a high standard of behaviour. The reason is simple. The vast majority of our students understand what is expected and do not want to let themselves and their school down. This certainly does not mean I believe there is no place for suspension and expulsion in this school as students in

the past have seen and I imagine will see in the future. Our current school plan includes a whole school review of our discipline and welfare system.

The level of accountability on teachers and schools is greater than any time in the 24 years I have been with the department. I am extremely lucky as Principal of this school as I can honestly say that all the teaching staff that turn up for work today I would welcome teaching my children. This is always the gauge I use to judge a teachers performance because I put myself in the position of a parent as well as the Principal of the school. Educational innovation is very important and I hope the massive weight of personal and professional accountability is not discouraging my teachers from being calculated risk takers. Teachers who are calculated risk takers are willing to try new techniques to unlock a student's love of learning. I feel good when I hear teachers talking excitedly about a student progressing academically or socially. This is a feature of the staffroom at this school.

Technology is part of the modern teaching and learning. However, I often wonder if technology ultimately will exclude a percentage of people from the workforce. Driverless cars and trucks are a reality that we will not avoid. Now is not the time to buy shares in blue singlets and stubbies or the new model truck called the Kenworth Stereotype. Driverless trucks will ultimately improve safety as a satellite does not suffer from fatigue or other physical and emotional stress

that affects performance. This makes it clear to me that schools more than ever need to teach students the ability and confidence to learn rather than pure content. This is why we need to embrace innovation in teaching especially those strategies that force students to question why it is the way it is and how it can be better. In the book, *Future Frontiers Education for the Artificial Intelligence World*, the authors state that for students to be successful in an Artificial Intelligence world they will also need humanities based subjects. Those students who can think from a human perspective are those who will maintain the social cohesion in our society, think outside the square and lead. It is an amazing job being a school Principal, you worry about which child continually places the toilet roll into the toilet (I will flush this person out) right up to how students will cope when computers develop artificial intelligence.

Next week is particularly busy. Monday Year 12 Technology day, Tuesday Secondary Reward Lunch, Wednesday 4T's at Tullamore, Wednesday and Thursday State PSSA Swimming and Black Friday Hot Food Day run by the P&C. I believe it is Nachos this time. Please support the P&C as they are a vital organisation within the school. There are meal deals as well as single items available.

SOCIAL/MOVIE NIGHTS POLICY

Social/movie nights are held at various times throughout the year to provide supervised social interaction to students of the school. Attendance at school social/movie nights is a privilege which is dependent on acceptable behaviour and cooperation from students, along with staff volunteering to supervise.

The following matters are relevant to the holding of social/movie nights at Trundle Central School.

Secondary social/movie nights will be organised by the Stage 5 Co-ordinator while Primary social/movie nights will be organised by the Assistant Principal. Attendance by staff at social/movie nights is voluntary. However, it is a requirement that at least 2 teachers indicate that they will be at the social/movie night before a social/movie night can be held.

Permission to attend social/movie nights will be granted if the student is on level 3 (secondary) level B or above as per the welfare policy. Primary students may not be granted permission to attend a social/movie night if they have been suspended prior to a social/movie night.

Parents / carers are welcome at all social/movie nights.

Notification of each social/movie night will be included on the Newsletter prior to the social/movie night being held. This will include the finishing time of each social/movie night.

It is expected that students will adhere to normal school standards of behaviour consistent with Trundle Central School's K-12 Welfare and Discipline Policy and Anti-bullying policy.

Tobacco, items that can be used as weapons and all forms of alcohol and other drugs are strictly forbidden at social/movie nights. Students found in possession of weapons or illegal drugs will be reported to police.

Social/movie nights will be restricted to students attending Trundle Central School. Approved guests may be invited by the school.

In general, Secondary social/movie nights shall run from 7.30 – 10.30pm in Summer and 7.00 – 10.00pm in Winter. In general, Primary social/movie nights will start at 7.00pm and end at 9.00pm in Summer and 6.30pm – 8.30pm in Winter. Infants' social/movie nights run from 6.00 – 7.00pm in Summer and 5.30 – 6.30pm in Winter. K-6 students must be picked up from the social/movie night by a parent/carer. Students are expected to remain at the social/movie night until the conclusion of the social/movie night. If children need to leave the social/movie night early, an explanatory note from a parent / carer should be given to the teacher organising the social/movie night at school on the day of the social/movie night.

Students who do not attend school on the day of the social/movie night should not attend the social/movie night. School absences should be consistent with DET acceptable reasons and students who are away sick should not attend social/movie nights on that night.

Students who arrive later than 15 minutes after the social/movie night begins will not be admitted unless the teacher in charge has been notified prior to the social/movie night or the student brings a note from parents. Parents / carers of students not admitted will be phoned immediately before students are sent home. Students will remain under supervision if parents / carers can not be contacted.

Students from Trundle Central School who attend social/movie nights at other venues or schools must comply with the above directions where applicable as well as those that pertain to the venue being visited.

This policy will be published in the school newsletter with the social/movie night notification.
