Principal's Message

This week years 3,5,7 and 9 will be sitting the NAPLAN tests. NAPLAN is a diagnostic tool for schools to determine target areas for improvement and the impact of Literacy and Numeracy programs operating within the school. The test was never designed to be a competition between schools or students. I am disappointed but not shocked when parents tell me entry into some schools is often determined on NAPLAN scores and students who are struggling academically are passively or even actively encouraged not to sit the test because of the fear of reducing the school average. One of the pillars of public education is our schools cater for and accept all students not just the academically gifted. My question is what sort of society we create if we restrict education only to the chosen few? Not one I want to live in!

On Wednesday 9/10 Agriculture will travel to Bedgerabong for the annual pig judging and handling day. Thursday is the Secondary movie night. This week as with every week, there is always something happening additional to the core curriculum in this great school. On Friday, the P&C is having a street stall. Please support our hard working dedicated P&C members.

The amount of Kangaroo poo on the oval is becoming an issue. I am assured that it is not toxic but parents may want to make sure that their children remove their shoes before walking across the shagpile. However using a growth mindset rather than deficit, I expect high-jump and hop, step and jump records to be broken this year at our carnival. A rough count on the weekend was a mob of fifteen. As long as they stay away from the front of a Toyota I will be happy.

Last week was our semester one - parent teacher interviews. The evening was an outstanding success in terms of the number of parents attending. I thank the P&C for providing a BBQ so children had dinner and were ready for bed at the end of the night. The sprinklers on the back oval went off whilst many children were playing soccer so they had their bath as well. Just part of the service. Students will soon learn the most dangerous words in reports and parent teacher interviews are but and however. Johnny has

potential but his behaviour is poor. See how but makes this sentence change completely in terms of pocket money and TV time for little Johnny.

Last Friday was our annual cross country. The weather was drizzling rain at times and a wind that would blow a black dog off the chain. Despite this or probably because of this students had a great day. These types of events are important for generating school spirit and giving students the opportunity to display their skills. Thank you to all the staff who through their positive attitudes make these activities a success.

Relationship expert Deanne Carson recently on the ABC stated that before you change a child's nappy you should ask for permission to establish a culture of consent. It is vitally important that we teach children about protecting their bodies to keep them safe, this is beyond question. However, I believe this type of statement from Ms Carson trivialises what is a real challenge for parents and educators in this complex world adults have created for them. Indeed, as your partner rolls over and states it is your turn at 3am or fakes sleep and you stagger into the child's room and there is a smell in the room that could wake the dead asking permission is probably not the first thing on your mind. Indeed, parents of little firemen will know when that nappy is removed you are often entering a war zone.

Currently I am reading research about traumatised children for a presentation I am giving to beginning teachers this month. A consistent message in all the literature is the need for young children to experience nurturing physical contact from a person they can trust unquestionably in a stable home environment. Those who are exposed to traumatic experiences as young children can have permanent damage to the functioning of the brain such as delayed emotional development. Between the ages of 0-4 is the most critical time for children. Children who do not have access to a nurturing adult during this time often carry this trauma through their lives but it is particularly apparent during puberty where trauma often appears in risk taking or other negative behaviours. The message seems to be that children will just not get over continued traumatic experiences, it is just suppressed in the brain until the changes brought about by puberty unlock this emotional vault. Complex things humans.

On Tuesday last week, the school had a workplace safety inspection. These events can be stressful because of the rapid changes in requirements and workplace conditions. Also the more you provide outside the core curriculum the greater the workplace health and safety considerations. Because of this

inspection, the school will require more details from parents of students who take medication at school. This information will only be shared with the staff members that distribute the medication so privacy is assured.

Parent/spectator behaviour at sporting events is an ongoing problem across the state. Just last year we had a situation where a parent from an opposing team was verbally abusive and threatened one of our players. This is an adult abusing a thirteen-year-old girl playing in a non-professional sporting event. It does not matter what angle you look at this incident it is just wrong. Tim Winton the author of one of the best novels ever written *Cloud Street* wrote, *parents often want in their children the courage and ability they could never achieve.* This is the only reason I can suggest for the passion and aggression some parents/spectators display at sporting events. They are compensating for the lack of past glory. The Department has a code of conduct for parent spectators at sporting events. A summary of the code is simple. Behave in a manner that allows every person to enjoy the event in a safe friendly atmosphere. News flash most kids do not care about the score two minutes after the game especially if a visit to McDonalds on the way home is part of the deal. Parents are the only ones playing for sheep stations.

This week we are sending out invitations to large corporations to become a supporter of the school. This idea is not only to generate funds but also to open up possible opportunities for our students for additional education or employment. We may send out numerous letters and not receive any positive response but we may manage to get one business on board. People are shot for robbing banks (ironic considering the Royal commission into banking, who is the robber?) not for trying new ideas, so we will see how this develops. One positive reply could make a significant difference to this school.

In some disappointing news our school and community netball/tennis court has been damaged. A person or persons by rocking the corner fence posts violently side to side has managed to crack the edge of the concrete slab. As with most things, someone knows who is responsible for this moronic behaviour. I am sure Judith would be happy for any information about this and other incidents that occur around the town. If an incident is not reported she cannot possibly follow up and hopefully remove this behaviour from our community?

The value of pets for children's emotional and cognitive development is well documented. The school is in the early stages of applying for a therapy dog. These are

the dogs who have just not made the grade for or are retired guide dogs. If successful, the dog would be used to help calm anxious students and to teach students responsibility. I am excited about this project and hope we will be successful with our application. I have asked the staff about this proposal and they have no objections. If you do not want this dog in the school please make the school aware. One objection is a consideration, multiple objections will naturally stop this project.

School uniform is very important in this school. The onset of the cooler weather has created some variations of uniform. Uniform has many functions but the most important one I feel is it creates a level playing field in relation to income. Imagine the difference in dress if uniform was not compulsory. Some of our students from families struggling financially would have genuine rips in their jeans as opposed to the designer rips in expensive jeans.

This year the school is offering amazing excursions. Our major secondary excursion is to the snow and three students have taken up the opportunity to travel to China in partnership with Condobolin High School. Travel now is cheaper and more reliable and our students are benefiting.



In the next few weeks our school to work students will be learning how to dismantle cars. Local girl, Ashley Farrar, who seems over the last couple of years to have perfected the art, inspires this activity.

Last week a bus driver reported a near miss at a bus stop on their run. Parents are responsible for their children until they enter the bus. Please supervise your children until they board the bus. The school will be running road safety class in the near future but it is essentially a parent responsibility.

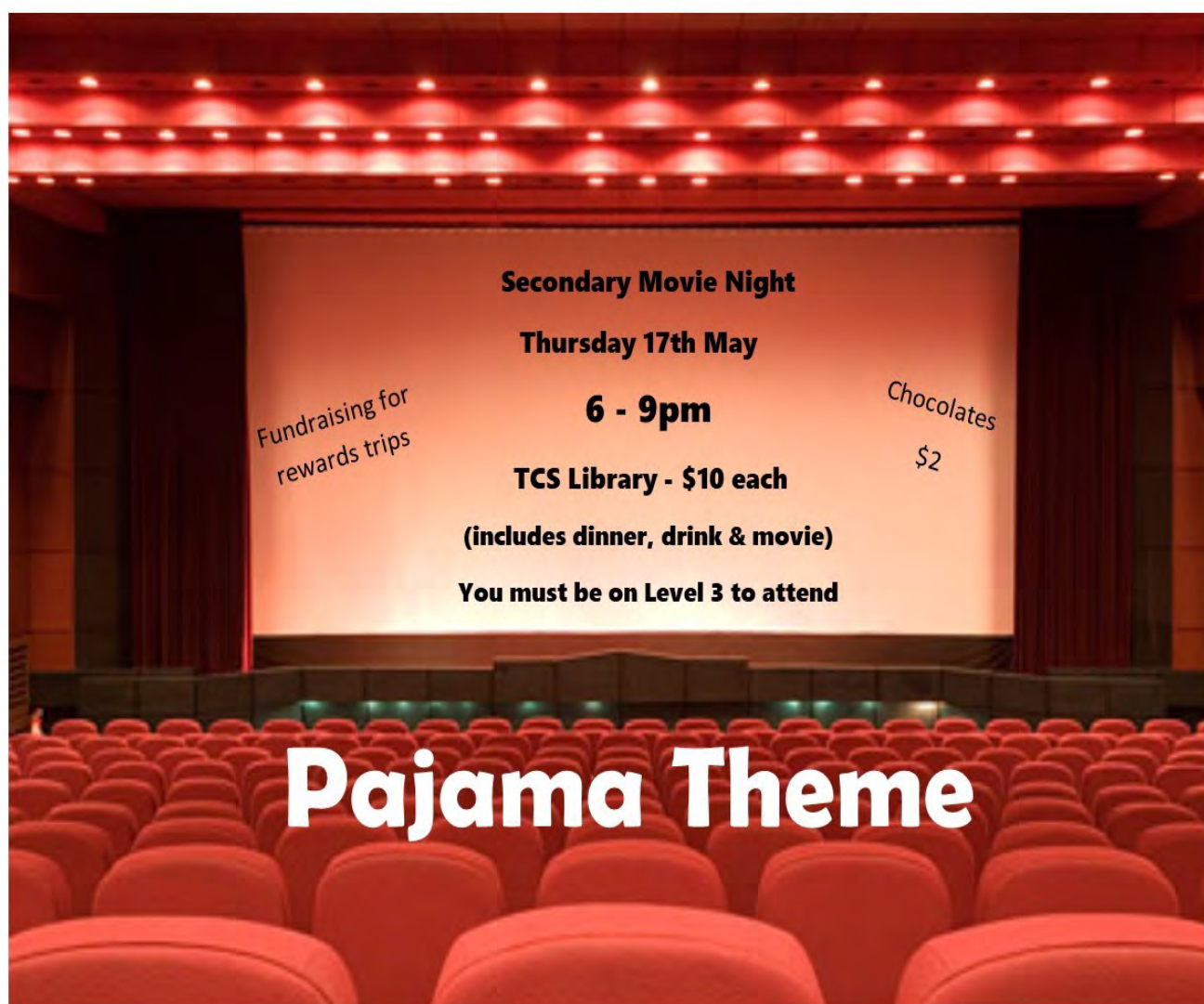

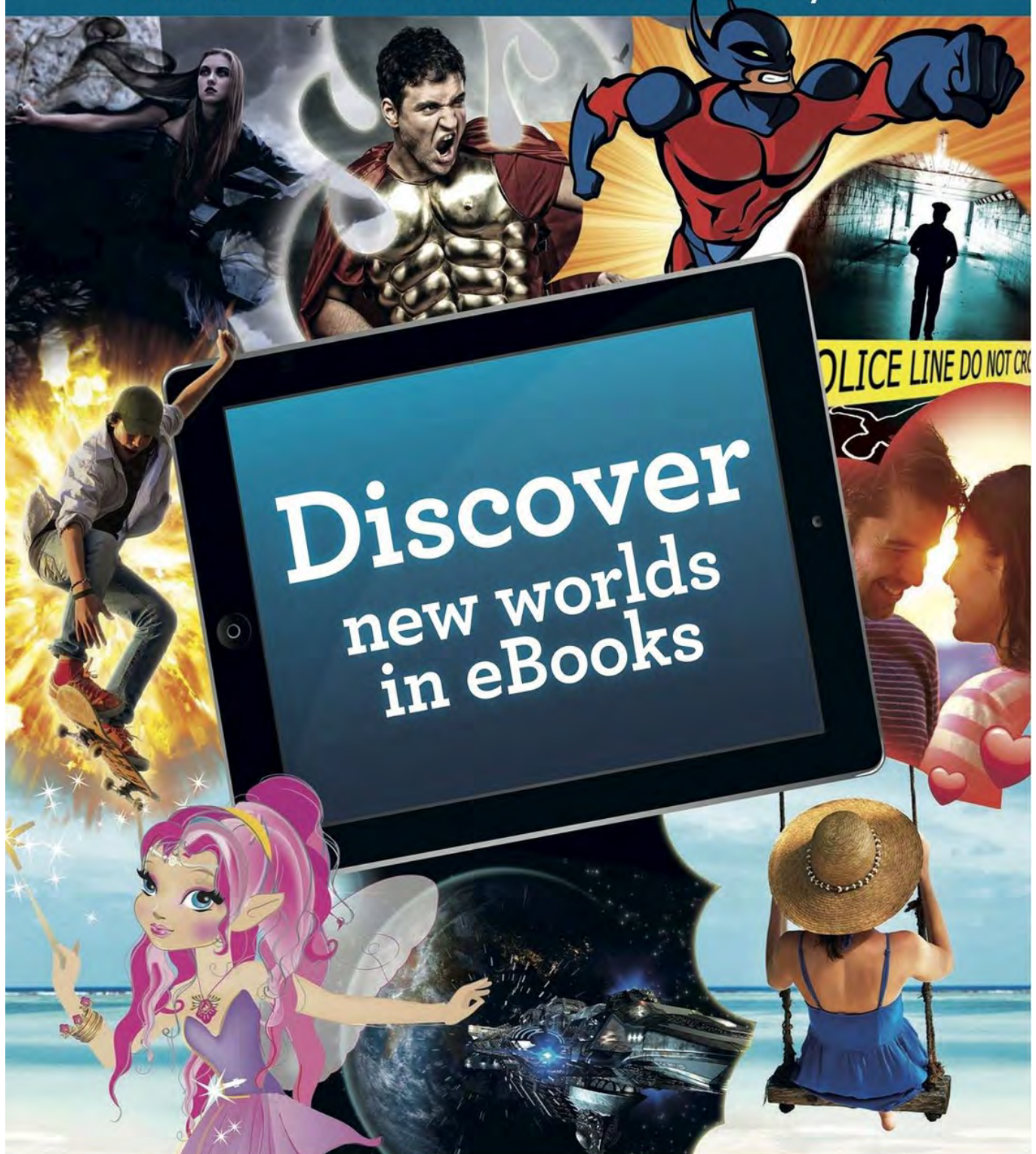

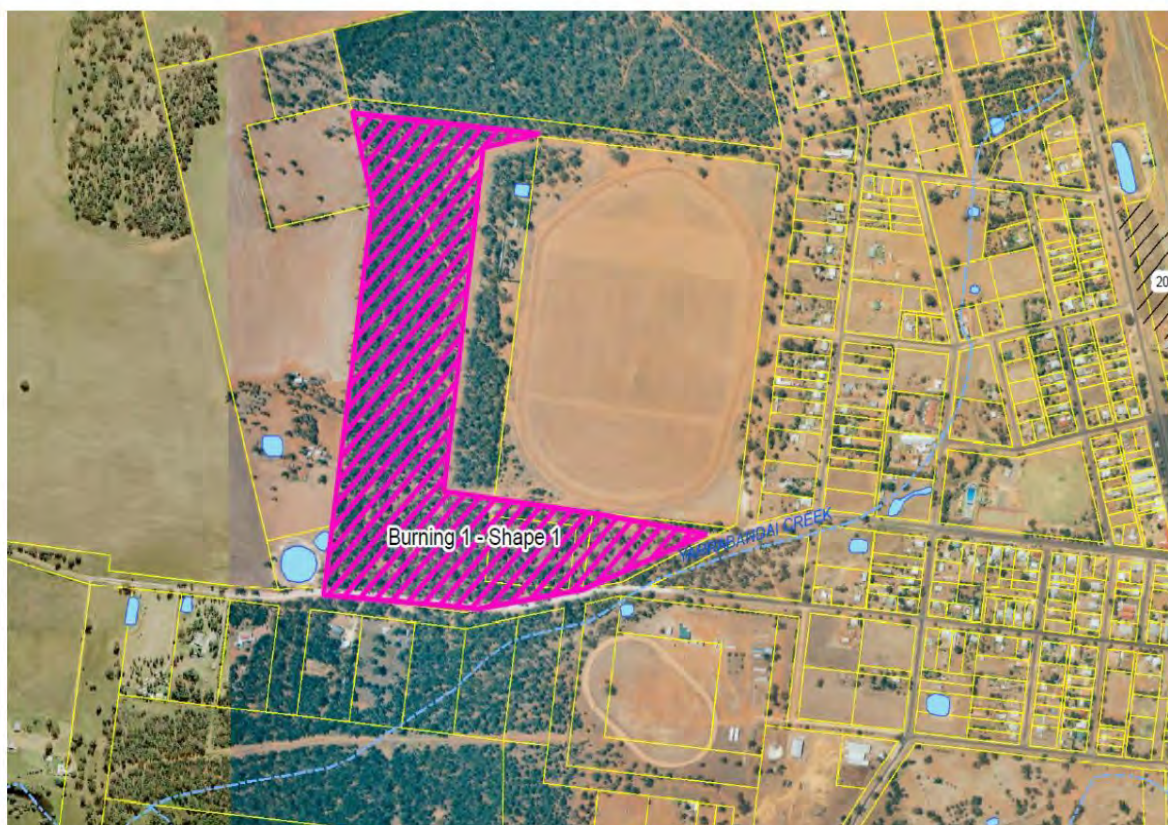

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Between Mentone Street & Carlisle – Trundle Road TRUNDLE 2875

The burn will be undertaken by the Rural Fire Service and subject to weather conditions. It is scheduled for:

Wednesday 16th May 2018 between 8am to 5pm

As the prescribed burn will generate smoke, hot embers and heat, it is important that you consider the following:

- Keep doors and windows closed to prevent smoke entering homes;
- Keep outdoor furniture under cover to prevent ember burns;
- Retract pool covers to prevent ember damage;
- Remove washing from clotheslines;
- Ensure pets have a protected area;
- If you are driving a vehicle, slow down, keep windows up and turn headlights on; and
- If you have asthma or a lung condition, reduce outdoor activities. If smoke levels are high and if shortness of breath or coughing develops, take your reliever medicine or seek medical advice

Should any further information be required, please contact the Mid Lachlan Valley District Office at MidLachlan.Team@rfs.nsw.gov.au or 02 6851 1541 between 9am and 4:30pm weekdays. You can also obtain additional information on prescribed burning and property preparedness by accessing the NSW Rural Fire Service website at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au.

If weather conditions become unfavourable on the scheduled burn day, the hazard reduction burn will be postponed until conditions become suitable.

Northparkes – Parkes Shire Sports Grants Handed Out

CMOC-Northparkes Mine (Northparkes) and Parkes Shire Council have announced the successful applicants from the latest round of the Sports Grants Funding Program.

Parkes Sports Council Chairperson, Alan Gersbach expressed his delight that a good selection of projects was received for this round and that most of them received a piece of the funding pie, which is provided annually by Northparkes Mine and Parkes Shire Council.

In total \$21,309.47 in grants were distributed this round. The remaining \$3,600 unallocated funds will be carried over for the next grant round.

Parkes Shire Councillor Louise O'Leary, who presides over the selection committee, is encouraging more community sporting groups to take advantage of the program.

"Parkes Shire Council has allocated additional funds towards the grants program to match the contribution made by Northparkes Mine. I would love to see the money spread around to more projects in the Parkes Shire", she said.

Community and External Relations Officer for Northparkes, Ali Creith, was pleased that Northparkes was able to facilitate another round of the successful program, which is now in its sixth year.

"Northparkes recognise how vital sport is to our local community; supporting the Parkes Sports Council Grants Program is one way we can contribute to some of the teams and clubs which do such a great job helping to keep Parkes healthy and happy," she said.

This was the first round under the new joint funding agreement between CMOC Northparkes Mine and Parkes Shire Council, which will distribute \$170k in sports related funding over the next three years. The next round, which opens in June, will see a total of \$28,690 available for sports related projects within the Parkes Shire.
