Principal's Message

This week is extremely busy which is typical in this outstanding school. Year 10 work experience all week, SRC PJ day on Thursday (raising money for Lifeline) and Friday Secondary Street Stall and Sand Green Golf played at Trundle.

Students at this school have already had the opportunity to experience 17 extra-curricular activities this term. The reason the extraordinary amount of extra educational activities outside the classroom can happen is the continuing goodwill of staff and the cooperative behaviour of our students.

Students are the masters of their own destinies in so many ways. Staff are very willing to go beyond the parameters of their jobs to provide extra opportunities as long as students display their appreciation through their positive behaviour and effort in the classroom. At a university that statement would have been explained over a two-week series of lectures culminating in a two thousand-word essay confirming the obvious. In my simple world however, if students are rude or behave poorly, staff do not give up as much of their own time to make school a more enjoyable and educationally enriching place to be. At this stage student behaviour in classes, playground and on excursions is exceptional, so let the good times roll. Whilst these activities are enjoyable in nature, they all have an educational purpose and as such contribute to students achieving the outcomes of the syllabus.

The idea of productive classrooms being quiet with students sitting in perfectly straight rows working quietly through the text book and diligently checking the answers in the back of the book is outdated and frankly I believe educational abuse in our modern world. Schools who are purely content driven and do not encourage the development of lateral, innovative thought are setting students up for failure in our dynamic employment environment. On this theme, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) is not a subject or a resource to be implemented it is a mindset where schools create a learning environment and mindset where content is not delivered only by teachers but students through interactive problem solving and challenges which generate first order knowledge for themselves. In short do not only teach what to learn but how. This is why this school does not advertise STEM lessons in isolation as the principles of

STEM are embedded in curriculum delivery across the whole school.

This week we have taken delivery of our new primary iPads. There are 25 new units. Enough for every student in a class to have access to their own device. It is exciting for me to witness rural students having access to this technology as it is another tool for the development of independent learning and reducing the possible disadvantage of isolation from major centres. Our existing iPads will be offered to the community for a small donation of around 30 dollars is my thinking at this stage, a limit of one per family. This will take place when the new devices are on line early next term. Any DET licenced software will be removed and their memories wiped as well. However, they will still be able to perform basic functions. To make it fair if we have a large response all people wishing to purchase will have their names placed in a draw and if successful they then have one week to pay for the device. More information next term.

Year 10 Work Experience may be an opportunity for students to make contacts that will open the door for future employment. I constantly remind students that the first job they obtain may not be their dream career but it opens the door to future opportunities and does not define their ultimate destiny. I started my formal working life as a professional bitumen golfer employed by the Moree Plain Shire Council. On a good day, we could even achieve two rounds of nine holes out and nine back, now I am working in education, a career far removed from my starting point. My next move will most likely be professional modelling but who knows your employment destiny so embrace the employment rather than the title.

The Student Representative Council is running a Pyjamas or dress down day on Thursday. This is to support lifeline. Lifeline is the crisis counselling service not the one Manly, Parramatta and Canterbury clubs and supporters are desperately trying to find. These activities are not only fun and something different for students to experience they help develop a social conscious. I am proud that our community service or school service elective is one of the most popular amongst the students. This indicates that our students realise they have a responsibility to community rather than just themselves.

There have been many positive comments about the large sign we have placed on the administration building. The message on this sign is to value being a good person rather than judging yourself by the material items you can collect or your sporting ability. My father always said do not value a person by the size of their wallet but by the way they treat people and their contribution. He also said air-conditioning in cars



will never catch on but he seemed to sum up people well. My reasoning for spending the money to have this sign made is to continually remind students that our materialistic society plays on their in-securities but if they are good honest people they are wealthy and important.

Advertising on television and other forms of electronic media I believe is a significant factor in the dramatic rise in young people suffering anxiety and depression related disorders. Take the advertisement for Western spreadable butter. This advertisement features a perfect family consisting of two children and mum and dad. These teenage children are broadly smiling like a puppy who has chewed your shoes but knows that any punishment you can give for this is insignificant because he has also urinated in your bed. Mum has provided a healthy breakfast for these two children and her loving spouse which is only made better by Western spreadable butter. This is the real world in every family or is it the two children are glued to the television, phone or play station, mum is screaming at them because they have yet again put the empty milk container back in the fridge and there are clean and dirty dishes in the dish washer. Dad and mum are not talking because they are both hung over and do not want to open any cans of worms before their brains realise what world they are living in. The truth in most families is somewhere on that spectrum. However kids do not know that, they expect their family to be the same as that advertised on television. The result in some is anxiety, feelings of failure and depression.

In the last few days, we have employed an additional worker to start to paint areas of the school that are looking a little tired. Over the last three years, we have made it a goal to improve the physical environment of the school. Educational research clearly states that students achieve better results in passive welcoming environments. This is why we have planted gardens and lawn and removed bitumen. Last year we repainted the brown doors with neutral white. This is because brown as a colour for young children is not welcoming or happy. No I have not been sitting cross legged

meditating on the top of a mountain it is much too cold for that. There is actually creditable research that proves the brain releases different chemicals in response to colour. Brown is negative depressive chemicals, neutral or bright, happy responses.

The school looks amazing but we cannot be happy, there is much more to do. I thank the Parkes Shire Council for their prompt reply to my requests to have the footpath on the Croft street side of the school replaced. The former footpath was damaged and dangerous. This one is not, so replacement is consistent with our goal of continuous improvement. I have had questions about why the footpath is so wide. The answer is I wanted it wide so when I need to purchase a gofer to come to work there is plenty of room for my gofer and students to pass safely. My achievable wish list is new fencing, painting of the original school building, new bus shelter and additional weather and shade protection. My aspirational list is a synthetic two lane bowling green to be placed adjacent to the netball court. Yes, I have been to one of those goal-setting workshops.

Providing quality facilities for students is made easier when I receive surprises such as the one provided by Ms Alice Johnson last week. Ms Johnson gave the school a very generous donation towards the replacement of our school bus. This donation along with fund raising moves the goal of a replacement bus just that little bit closer for students. Our school bus is not only a mode of transport it is part of our welfare program because it allows students of all socio-economic statuses the ability to access services at a reduced cost. The school operates the bus at approximately half what it costs to hire a similar bus. I have approached charities and business organisations for assistance in replacing the bus. I realise it is a long shot but people get shot robbing banks not trying to provide services for students in low socio economic communities. As mentioned previously trees within the school have been identified as needing attention. These will be removed in the first week of the holidays. Surrounding the new courts will eventually be trees and olive trees along the boundary. On the spectrum of trees I am not rip, rip wood chip but I also believe trees are a renewable resource and the tree must be safe and have a function. Nearby residents will experience some noise during this work.

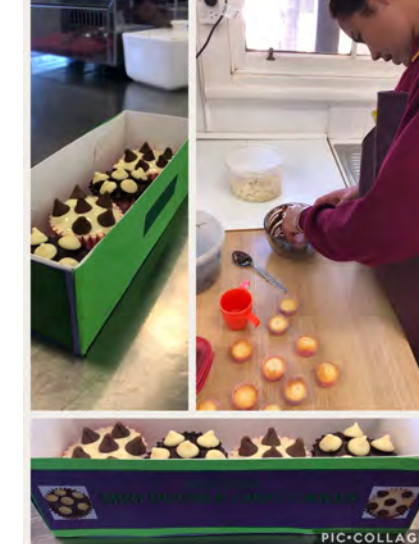

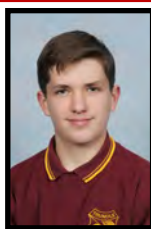

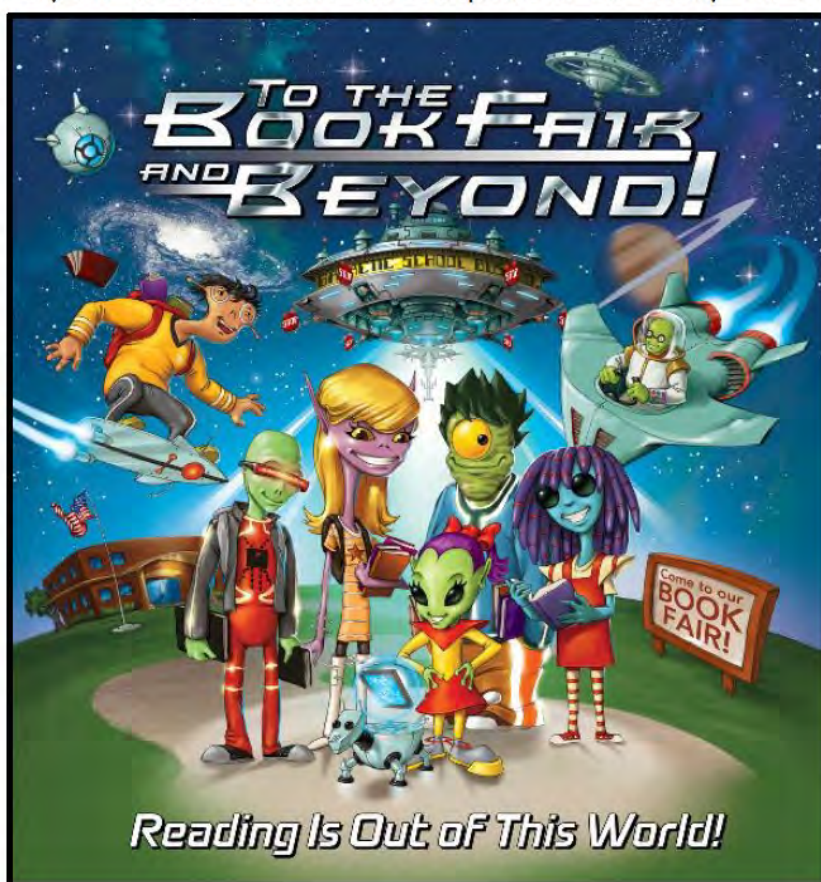

Hearing Screening

It is best practice and in your interest to have hearing screen to detect early signs of noise injury. This can alert you to prevent further damage as well as help to manage any existing hearing loss. Some states require employers to provide regular and/or baseline hearing screening to employees by OHS law (Vic, Tas, WA). Contact your local Doctor or State Work Health Authority for more details.

The Risk and Risk Management

All farmers, farm works and farm families exposed to excessive farm noise are at risk of hearing loss through noise injury. To reduce the risk of damage to hearing, think S.A.F.E. about noise hazards.



- S See It**
Identify noisy farm activities
- A Assess It**
Identify who is at risk, how often, how loud and for how long.
- F Fix It**
Reduce noise levels or exposure to noise. Use a variety of controls
- E Evaluate it**
Continue to monitor on-farm noise

Noise Control Measures

Eliminate the hazard

Can the job be done without the hazard? Eg: automatic feeders for pig sheds)

Substitution for a lesser hazard

Use a quieter alternative – if possible, use a cabined tractor instead of one without a cabin.
Buy a quieter alternative when the time comes to replace machinery (check the dB labels).

Engineering/design options

Install mufflers on equipment
Cabins on tractors and other equipment
Rearrange the workshop layout
Noise barriers and insulated walls
Plastic/metal chutes, electric / diesel motors

Safer work practices and procedures

Regularly maintain equipment – engines, seals, brackets and mufflers
Avoid noise – stand further away to supervise.
limit time exposed in one day – rotate tasks.
Provide hearing protection & information on noise to works. Safety sign noisy areas.
