Principal's Message

This week is Gobondary Narraff Athletics Wednesday and Primary Creative Arts Day Thursday. The Primary Creative Arts Day will allow students to create or finish off art works for the show. This year as with all years, Trundle Central School will be well represented across all sections of the show. I especially encourage people to view the exceptional work of our school to work students in the welding section and the outstanding art. One of the functions of art is to challenge our thoughts and at times shock us into a different level social consciousness. Some of the senior art works are of dark or controversial topics. I thought about removing them from the sample but one person's offence is another's social statement.

Cultural institutions such as the show are under threat in our technology driven society. However, I believe it is vitally important that we maintain the show as part of country life. Some aspects of all shows are competitive especially in the fig jam or scones category but this show is also a chance to display the resilience of country people in these hard times by attending and socialising. My suggestion for scones is to sift the flour twice and fresh butter rather than butter that has been in the fridge uncovered or on the bench. Cream strictly at room temperature. The unfortunate incident when I was working for the Russian Olympic team when I used all of Mikhail's secret herbs on the chicken and Kim became Tim overnight has meant I am no longer able to cook for the public but still follow my cooking advice for light fluffy consistent texture.

On Wednesday last week, I under the supervision of Mrs P and Mrs Strudwick, officials from the lotteries department, a priest and a Buddhist monk, I conducted the draw for the 40 dollar iPads. We had 48 requests for 20 available iPads so many requests could not be accommodated.

Each iPad comes with a case, charger and concrete warranty. Once it leaves school concrete you own all the benefits and the problems.

Last week our annual NAIDOC Day celebrations were conducted. Judging by the laughter and smiles on the students faces, the sessions were both entertaining and educational. A true sign of a knowledgeable, confident presenter is to be able to deliver a serious message in a fun entertaining fashion to students. Mark was glowing in his praise of our student's behaviour and enthusiasm. Naturally, we would not expect or tolerate anything less from our students. It was so windy on Friday the lines were blowing off the roads but most students coped well on the field trip.

ABC Central West visited our school on Friday last week. This was in response to our decision to open our showers to farming families struggling with the availability of water. This is a service to the community in these dry times. If your family is running out of water simply contact the school to book an appropriate time after school or on the weekend. It will only be your family that is using the showers at this time so privacy is assured. All showers have been renewed, have plenty of hot water and lockable doors are connected to each cubicle. Care packages of soaps, shampoo etc. are also available. Singing is optional but certainly not encouraged unless it is something from the 1970's classic pub rock collection. Country songs about your ute, dog or love for your mother or granny are strictly banned. Not many left really.

I especially wanted to make very clear to the ABC that country people do not expect charity and the extra government and private assistance I believe is payback for feeding and clothing the nation. Australia produces the best and cleanest food and fibre in the world. A simple suggestion I also made is a family could drive out to Trundle from Parkes and Forbes and spend money in our local businesses. The business community suffers when we move into drought as well as farmers directly and I do not want any more vacant shops in the main street. Once they are gone, they seem to be lost unfortunately for a long time. Many a sorry young person after a Boomer's game has been saved from an early morning world of pain by a good bacon and egg burger. I hope that our café

will re-open in the near future for those emotionally busted souls I often see early morning in the main street after a home game. Thankfully they can go on the cheese and bacon pie program.

Recently I also wrote to schools in Sydney to appeal to them to include Trundle Central School when fund raising or donating products. I am particularly interested in quality soaps, perfumes etc. for care packages as these are expensive items and when things are financially tight girls often do without or buy cheaper alternatives. This is Trundle Central's way of showing that we understand that drought has an enormous human cost to wives, partners and daughters as well as the obvious toll on men and livestock. The feature could be on Thursday night. Obviously if any of the parents of these schools are managing directors of Toyota, Nissan or Mitsubishi a new bus will be greatly accepted.

This service to the community is outside the traditional role of a school. However, I believe this school is a hub of the community rather than operating as a single function entity. That is why we sponsor the Boomers, the show and conduct community service. If we can help out just a little to save precious water in your rain water tanks it will be worthwhile.

In this newsletter is an advertisement for a raffle the school is conducting to start to accumulate funds for the future replacement of our school bus. The Department of Education does not directly fund school buses so the school needs to ask the community for help. There are five prizes that winners can choose from in the order that the tickets are drawn. For example, if you are the first drawn you have the choice of one item from all five prizes. If you are the fifth drawn you take what is left. The list of prizes include:

- Adam Hall's 2018 match jumper signed by the Boomers first grade team.
- 2018 Knights hand signed match jumper.
- Two Gold Coast Titans supporter shirts.
- 2018 Roosters supporters pack
- Cowboy's football.

The above teams may not be your favourite team with the exception of the Boomers. However, the value of the prize should only be part of the

incentive to purchase. Our school bus allows our students to access experiences and resources beyond Trundle at a reduced cost to parents. I thank Phillip Gray from Ag n Vet and Debbie and Robert Stevenson for 500 dollar donations to the bus fund raising. These two people donated because they are operating outstanding local businesses who always support this school and the community, not for any publicity. However, any business sponsoring our new bus will be listed on the bus. Considering the bus travels over 25,000 kilometres per year it is fantastic advertising for a business.

Last Friday I had a meeting with the Clean TeQ Community Relations team. If the mine is successful under the conditions of their development application a percentage of profits need to be returned to the communities adjacent to the mine. Naturally as education is continuous, sustainable and adds enormous value to the community I will be seeking our share of the community enhancement funds. If I was not proactive in seeking these funds I should not be leading the school. I have been on record stating that the traffic assessments indicate that the increased heavy traffic movements past the school if managed correctly will not create an unacceptable risk to students. These statements should not be interpreted as the school or myself supporting or opposing the mine this is not our place. I am often asked so I am stating the facts rather than an opinion or continuing a rumour.

Some time ago, I applied to Guide Dogs Australia for a *Pets as Therapy* dog. Next Friday the assessment officer will visit our school to determine if the school environment is suitable and if so match a suitable dog. These dogs are trained to support students with anxiety or behavioural related conditions but they also contribute positively to the whole school environment. Our school does not have a higher incidence of these conditions. However, if one child suffers, to me it is worth thinking outside the square for a solution. Royal Guide Dogs is an internationally recognised world leader in the training of companion and therapy dogs so if successful this animal will be an enormous benefit to our students as research clearly indicates the benefit of these *Pets as Therapy Dogs*.

I have stated numerous times in this forum that one of my goals is students will experience every opportunity in this school as is available to those in larger centres. Currently I think we have exceeded this goal with offering the snow and China trip in one year. The cost of the snow trip is heavily subsidised through fund raising by Ms Rowlings and students and donations by Teachers Mutual Bank, Clean TeQ and Trundle Parent and Citizens Incorporated. Considering some schools are offering one day in the snow and return early next morning for the same price as our excursion it is excellent value. Unfortunately, there is still considerable money owing for this excursion placing increased pressure and burden on the school.

Raising children is one of the most difficult tasks in the world. In 24 years of teaching I have seen an unfortunate increase in the number of students who display arrogance and inappropriate sense of social entitlement. I believe this has been created by some parents, schools and sporting clubs choice to formally reward basic social and behavioural expectations rather than excellence. I have seen award ceremonies trivialised by making up awards so every child wins a prize. The award for the kind smile goes to..... Overt and unnecessary recognition or praise is not the reality in the workforce or society in general as you cannot be selected, popular or win all the time. When people start to use those powerful words NO or you are WRONG some students cannot cope. They have been allowed to create a protective veneer of false talent or importance around them. Again balance is important, encourage and praise your children but always have in the back of your mind that you need to remember the big picture. Even if you think your child is one in a million there are still at least 25 people in Australia that are as good or better, so encourage determination and vision to succeed rather than arrogance. Humans can send a spaceship to mars but are yet to include an instructional manual with children at birth. Can you see the problem?

Kayden Charlton Little has joined an elite club in winning the services to motorcycling award. He joins previous winners Will Charlton, Jamie Harper and Hamish Sanderson. I do not think we

need any more inductees into the hall of fame students.

Numbers for 2019 were due last week. At this stage, the school will grow slightly next year again with 121 students. However, we would love more because in the public system one student enrolling can make an enormous difference in terms of staffing. If you are considering enrolling your child for 2019, please come and see us so we can add to our data base for staffing and funding. This school is very close to achieving an extra teaching position, a 90,000 dollar injection into the Trundle economy as the vast majority of my staff choose to live in the community they work within.

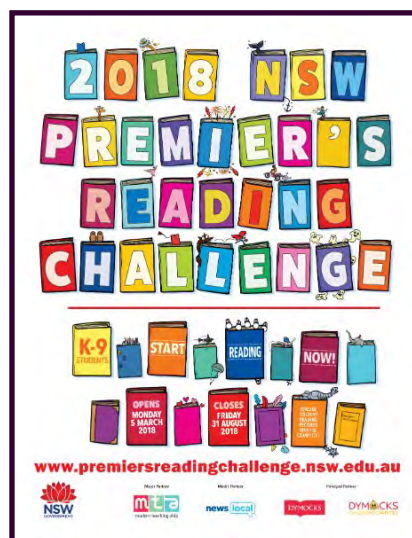
Creative Arts Day
