Principal's Message

This week is the Trundle Show. Congratulations to students and teachers for their outstanding effort in preparing exhibits for the show. Country shows compete with the instant gratification that electronic games provide for young people. The *Cha Cha* ride does not have a reset button but it is great fun so enjoy. I scare students when I tell them that this ride was around when I was a student because some do not believe there was even electricity. Their faces change from doubt to sheer terror. I passionately believe that the tradition of a country show has a place in rural life and needs to be maintained and protected. My daughter often asks me to go on rides with her but I tell her I remember the Middle Trundle Road before the upgrade so my days of constant violent rocking are well and truly over. Inside the show program is an old photo of our school captains. Our current school captains are Monique Morgan and Harrison Williams. These two students are following the long tradition of outstanding captains of this school.

Last week 7 students qualified for the State Central School Carnival in Athletics. This is an outstanding effort considering many of the students we compete against are from much larger schools. However, it is not the size of the school that matters it is the determination and talent of the students. Remember we never refer to our school as small because it has connotations of lack of facilities and spirit. We are a boutique school providing a specialist product.

The most important and valuable asset for any child is what is between the ears and what beats in the chest. If your child believes they cannot achieve they will most likely live up to that potential. Conversely, a positive attitude and determination to succeed are solid foundations for achievement. Our students constantly prove to me that distance from a major centre is not a barrier to success, just a longer road trip. Maybe our organically

fertilised oval from the ever increasing number of starving Kangaroos that are calling the school home at night is having a positive effect. Not many Principals when they view security camera footage can see the offender is a Kangaroo eating the young strawberry plants in the primary garden. If that Kangaroo is following our ethos of continuous improvement, next week will bring the cream. The notes for the girl's self-defence classes need to be returned. These classes are to give our girls the basic skills to be assertive in a threatening situation. The school is providing this service to our girls because we believe a quality school provides a holistic education equipping students for the world they live in and the future challenges they face. Trundle is an extremely safe community but our families and community will need to lend our children to the world at some stage and the protective environment we have created in Trundle is not as common in the places they will live and visit.

The snow excursion is fast approaching. This is a fantastic opportunity for our students to experience something that many of us have never seen or rarely see, snow and unfortunately rain this year. This excursion is only possible because of the fundraising and work of Ms Rowlands, students and donations. We need your contribution to be paid because this school does not have the capacity to further subsidise this excursion. If you paid your deposit, you gave a moral commitment to this excursion and the final price was calculated on this commitment.

Whilst I was in Sydney last week I visited a hotel to have a mineral water and a tofu burger. Andrew Webster, Rugby League writer and footy show personality was also consuming a few beverages. I approached him (I hope he did not mistake me for a current first grade player) in regards to the Rugby League raffle we are running to raise money for a replacement bus. He gave me his phone number and seemed confident that he can obtain more items to raffle which would be amazing. I checked the number because, when I was younger it was disappointing how many young women made a mistake in their phone numbers, when I brushed off my Levi's and flanno and plucked up the courage to ask for them. I would run down to the phone box put in my 20 cents only to find it was the number of an elderly couple. Got a lot of lawn

mowing jobs but not many dates in the eighties.

Last week we received positive media coverage in relation to the drought. I did an interview on Richard Glover's Drive program and Friday we were on ABC news and breakfast program. I am absolutely sick of Trundle people telling me that there are people that are doing it tougher than them in terms of the drought. Even if this is true what is the relevance? That statement reminds me of the classic Monty Python scene where the brave knight loses an arm in a sword fight only to reply it is only a flesh wound, I have had worse. Why shouldn't we tell our story? There seems to be this culture that we do not ask for help because it diminishes self-concept or the worth of the farmer.

Consider this way of looking at drought. A major supplier to a steel mill cannot supply an essential product. If the mill closes, governments and the public step in to support the people affected. A major supplier to the agricultural sector is failing to supply, it is not raining! This entitles you to support under the social function of governments and I still believe this is a great country and people want to help. The school has 4 hot showers and quality toiletries are expensive so let us help. A decent shower uses 60 litres of water, if you have 5 people in your family that is 300 litres per night. Let us help your family.

I love the compassion of our students. Recently the SRC asked if we could have a fund raising activity for farmers. When I pointed out that it was actually us that people are raising the money for they still wanted to try and raise money. The bus is the big item that will come up in the near future as it is doing a lot of kilometres over rough roads and will need upgrading. We need the bus because it allows our students to experience opportunities and cultures beyond Trundle. Those rattles may give the bus character but eventually they will give us spare parts so replacement is the goal next year.

Recently I wrote to Sydney and Newcastle schools to ask for assistance for our students dealing with drought. Mathew Pearce Public School Baulkham Hills and Newcastle High School have responded to our letter directly and several others have contacted us since the radio interview. Mathew Pearce Public School is holding fund raising activities and sending toiletries for our care

packages. This school is 1400 students in a Sydney Suburb so I have chosen a very similar school to Trundle. Newcastle High School is a large High School but the Principal is a former Wellington resident so understands the country. I am very proud of the education community and I am sure these people are genuine in their promises, lovely letters and emails. One hundred percent of all donations received will go to our students. I was very insistent both to the schools and the media that our community is proud and we are changing our school to support our students not letting it beat us.

One idea Matthew Pearce is doing is pyjamas for farmers. This is a variation on the fiver for a farmer. It would be great if other schools would take on this mufti day theme as my goal of raising \$20,000 to buy feed for our farming families is still a long way away. The obvious advantage of a public school donating directly to another public schools is administration costs are not removed from the donation and 100 percent can be spent on the purchase of hay.

I hope that we can raise enough money for a truck load of quality hay. I realise this is a very small contribution to your feed bill after we divide it between our families. As I explained to Sydney media it is not charity it is recognition that we produce the cheapest, best quality and cleanest food and fibre in the world. It is also a chance for your kids to feel they are contributing to the farm through their school. If it does not come off like the brave knight in Monty Python it is only a fresh wound to my confidence and enthusiasm and the care that this school gives to your children. I want to show students that schools care beyond the classroom and the fact that their school is helping gives them a way of contributing to your family. This small contribution by your children I believe will go a long way to helping them emotionally through our current challenges.

My next step is to write letters to Forbes, Dubbo, Orange and Parkes papers to encourage people to do day trips to Trundle to leave a little money in our businesses to help them through this dry time. Small country towns such as Trundle cannot afford any more vacant shops. These towns are struggling and if they are lost, part of Australian culture is lost with them. This country is in danger of becoming

the capsicum country with all of our population around the edges and nothing in the middle if these towns die.

One disappointing aspect of my Sydney trip was a protest by animal activists in the Pitt Street Mall. One of their arguments was farmers are responsible for the murder of animals during this drought for introducing inappropriate animals to the Australian environment and overstocking. The Minister for finance and home affairs Anastasia and I made our utter disgust at this argument known to this group and any other person that was willing to listen. The protesters were not really willing to listen that farmers are absolutely devastated to see their quality animals suffering because of something that is outside their control and we are some of the best and most efficient farmers in the world. I passionately believe in free speech. However, the old saying do not argue with a fool always needs to be remembered.

Finally I would like to pay tribute to the staff and students at this school. Also my wife the minister for home affairs and finance Anastasia who has to listen to me rambling about various topics and sometimes tell me to pull my head in. When I have these ideas such as the Sydney radio interview, pets as therapy dog and the showers, it places increased pressure upon them because the

routines and structures of the school are changed. We had 385 additional hits on our web site in two days last week alone and many phone calls.

Workloads are increased and the more our school puts itself out in the public the more opportunity we have for criticism and failure which is always a risk. However, I believe in this boutique school we (not me) are developing something unique for our students and you will never convince me that a student attending Trundle Central School does not deserve as much as any child attending school in this country.

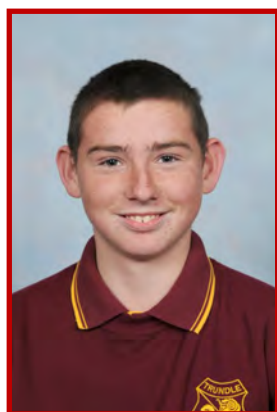

In an effort to reuse and recycle, Parkes Shire Council will donate its used technology to the Parkes Men's Shed.

Each year, Council's Information and Technology team replaces a number of PCs, tablets and laptops to best service its 200 strong workforce.

Previously, the used devices were sold to IT dealers or auction houses. However, the demand for such items is now in decline.

Parkes Shire Council's Information Services Manager, Anthony McGrath said, "this new arrangement is positive for both Council and our community."

"While these devices and machines may not fulfil the specific needs of Council any longer, they are still in excellent, working condition."

"Parkes Men's Shed will be able to on-sell them to local residents who may not have the means to purchase a new one."

"The money from each sale goes back into the Men's Shed - a fantastic volunteer group that deliver many projects for our community."

Curiosity + Wonder ... Science, Music, Creativity

To quote the great late Albert Einstein "Curiosity is more important than knowledge".

In the pursuit of curiosity Parkes Library celebrates authors, books, science, art and creativity in August and September each year.

According to Parkes Branch Librarian, Andrea Lovell, the Library team wants to re-awaken the communities sense of wonder and encourage everyone to let curiosity lead their life.

"The 2018 Curiosity + Wonder events include reviving an old craft - crocheting, exploring the art of eco dying, learning more about the slow clothing movement and upcycling, Australian author Morris Gleitzman will be in town and science is celebrated in a range of workshops" said Andrea.

Curiosity + Wonder commences with a visit to Parkes by Australian social entrepreneur and author Jane Milburn. Jane believes in the magic of remaking and upcycling and is hosting a community talk on rethinking the clothing culture, and workshops "Transformation from Nature" and "Snip and Stitch Upcycling".

For the families that are unable to attend Storytime during the week, it is also being held on Saturdays during September. Join the Library team at 11am on 1st, 8th and 15th September for games, stories, play, making and much discovery! (Note bookings are not required).

For those who have wanted to learn how to crochet they can at the beginners crocheting class commencing Saturday 8 September.

Over the two Saturdays participants will learn basic crochet techniques, what the most common stitches are and how to read crochet patterns. At the end of the workshops you will have created your own crochet pieces for your enjoyment. This is a two Saturday commitment and bookings are required.

Curiosity and Wonder events are also planned for the Shire's students, with a visit by Morris Gleitzman and Fizzics Education being hosted.

Morris Gleitzman, Australian Children's Laureate for 2018-19, is a bestselling Australian children's author. His books explore serious and sometimes confronting subjects in humorous and unexpected ways. His titles include *Two Weeks With The Queen*, *Grace*, *Doubling Thomas*, *Bumface*, *Give Peas A Chance*, *Extra Time*, *Loyal Creatures*, *Snot Chocolate* and the series *Once, Then, Now, After, Soon and Maybe*. Morris lives in Sydney and Brisbane, and his books are published in more than twenty countries. High school students from across the Shire will be attending sessions with Morris at Parkes Library.

Sydney based Fizzics Education is one of Australia's leading science outreach providers of interactive science workshops and shows. Parkes Library is bringing their CSI Forensic workshop for high school students and Slime, Sherbet and Bubbles sessions for Kinder to year 2 students to town early September.

Curiosity + Wonder will conclude with the annual PARKES FUN PALACE!

The global Fun Palaces movement believes in the genius in everyone, in everyone an artist and everyone a scientist, and that creativity in community can change the world for the better. Parkes Library will become the Parkes Fun Palace on Saturday 22 September, opening its doors from 9am to 3pm.

The family friendly day will feature experiments, games and art, as well as a visit by Ian from Fun Day Out who is bringing his Adventure Quest and trash percussion sessions to the Coventry Room.

Adventure Quest, at 9.30am and 11am, is an interactive show based on the ideals of the 'Pick a Path/Choose Your Own Adventure' novels and combines music, storytelling, drama and dance together in one great show.

Trash Percussion at 1pm is an exciting, vibrant and all-inclusive style of percussion designed with the view that anything and everything can be a musical instrument.
