Principal's Message

This week is our snow trip. The snow season is the best for many years so there is no excuse but just to have fun. This school works hard to provide these opportunities for our students. I would like to pay special tribute to Miss Leisa Rowlands who through her dedication and passion for the students of this school has significantly reduced the cost of this excursion for all students through fund raising. Miss Rowlands is an example of our teachers not viewing teaching as restricted to the classroom but involves catering for the whole child. Excursions such as this one broaden a student's cultural knowledge and provide vital opportunities for students to learn to socialise and interact effectively within a larger group. Unfortunately, my invitation to the excursion was lost in the mail. An alternative activity I am taking part in is splashing ice on my face, falling down on my backside and laughing. This is my memory of the only time I have seen snow and attempted skiing.

This week is also the Merino Wether Challenge in Dubbo. This involves students adding condition to sheep and training them to be led. This season has been particularly challenging for this activity but our students have persevered, and we are still entering a team; a credit to the students and Mr Ridges and Mrs Williams. We were very successful last year so the students have a challenge ahead of them. Unfortunately, we lost Lamb Chop and BBQ early in the year but we still have a team of five. Survivor, He was too fast, Vegetarian, Freezer is full and Watch out someone is watching, will I am sure, do us proud. Any profit from this activity will go back into the agriculture program of the school to allow us to compete next year.

The Country Fair (Continental) is fast approaching. This year the P&C are trying something different, starting the fair at 1:30pm, and finishing at 6.00pm. This allows bus children whose parents cannot come into the Country Fair the opportunity to take part. The P&C is also allowing students through application and effort to earn 'Bush Bucks' that they can use at the Continental. I congratulate the P&C for having the courage to try something different and through the distribution of Bush Bucks, and the change of time, will give all students the opportunity to be part of the Bush

Fair. Change is always challenging to some but if we are not willing to innovate and challenge the status quo how can we possibly improve? If you have a passionate objection to the change in times for the Continental, feel free to fax me or use the pay phone to ring me.

This Friday we are holding a Blue Day. This is to raise money for research into curing prostate cancer. Our students always get behind good causes, this town still has **enormous community spirit**.

The school is running a Rugby League Raffle to raise some money for the replacement of the school bus. The bus has been a faithful servant for three years now but was purchased second hand so it is starting to show some wear and tear from our rough roads. I met Andrew Webster, Rugby League writer from the Sydney Morning Herald two weeks ago and he promised that he could get us more Rugby League merchandise. I have not heard back so at this stage we will be raffling off what we currently have (refer to the advertisement). Our bus allows our students experiences outside the confines of Trundle, and has an educational as well as pastoral care function. I thank Adam Hall for agreeing to donate a signed 2018 (hopefully Premiership winning jersey) as a prize.

Matthew Pearce Public School has partnered with us to raise money and collect resources for our families. This Sydney school has over 1400 students. This level of generosity humbles me, and reinforces my belief in the quality of this country and human spirit. I would love to visit this school in the future to personally thank them but I wonder if I have the ability to fully communicate my appreciation and respect for their support. This school and Newcastle High School has reenergised my belief in public education's ability to perform the vital social function of helping all groups within our society and reducing inequality. Mathew Pearce Public School and Newcastle High School are examples of what is still good in this country and in public education.

On Tuesday last week, a long-term resident of Trundle expressed to me that she feels a bit embarrassed about the attention Trundle is receiving. I will never understand why many country people believe they are not worthy of support and recognition. The attitude that we just have to tough it out because we choose to live in rural areas may have been relevant when distance created an enormous barrier but in our modern world I believe is not relevant. I remember when my father would work on the car for a week before we went on holidays and carried fan belts,

radiator hoses, points, water and a prayer. Now I cannot remember the last time I checked the oil. City people are not supporting us and taking an interest because they feel sorry for, or are patronising us. There is still genuine good will and compassion left in this country despite our almost constant exposure to negativity, people still want to help. I encourage farmers next time the hay drive comes through town to reward these people for their efforts, generosity and willingness to help. We no longer need to man the trenches to protect our way of life; the spirit is still alive with these hay drives.

Mr Grady, inventor, artist and Laundromat developer has erected a net around the basketball court. This does restrict access to a degree but it has three functions. The net contains the ball within the court reducing the chance of a student being hurt by a ball moving between areas. The net also stops the ball running down to the back fence forcing unnecessary breaks in games during competition. The third function is best practice is to have an enclosed basketball court. Now we have one, no further explanation needed. The erection of this net will be an issue for some in the short term but in few weeks people will think it has always been around the court. I thank Mr Grady and Trangie Central School who donated the net, for allowing us the opportunity to make our courts safer.

As Principal it is my job along with Mrs Cleal to lead educational debate in this town. This not only involves what happens in the classroom but how natural events such as drought affect children. This is why I have been very busy with the media and looking for ways to reduce the anxiety children feel in this dry time. An additional strategy is our Pets as Therapy Dog, Ajax who will be joining us on Thursday this week. This is a very left field strategy, especially since we are a mainstream environment rather than a specialist school or facility. In my interview with Guide Dogs I was asked what our need was. The answer is simple. If one child can benefit, it is worth us looking for alternative strategies. Therapy dogs have been proven not only to be an effective pastoral care strategy but have been proven over many years to increase student engagement.

The new teacher housing is complete at a cost of around 700,000 dollars. This has been a significant financial boost to our town and will eventually allow teachers to live in state of the art accommodation in the town they work. This will be a further cultural and financial boost to this town. The problem stopping occupation is some electrical work that needs to be completed by Essential Energy and the contractor. When this is complete, teachers can start to move in.

This construction will allow two more teachers to live locally. All my teachers express the desire to live locally; a credit to them as it displays their commitment to the town.

This weekend is a big weekend for Trundle. Friday is our annual Continental, Bush Tucker Day and Trundle Boomers are playing in the Grand Final. A new event is the Testicle Festival, raising money for research into prostate cancer. I congratulate the organisers for establishing this event.

I was not at school last week because of pre-planned leave. Unfortunately, it was interrupted by an emergency change of plans when I was forced to go to Canberra as it was almost up to my turn to be Prime Minister. Unfortunately, it appears that I won a chook in the raffle, not the second prize leading this great country. I hope that all this disruption is over now and our leaders can get back to tackling the numerous issues facing Australia.

COUNCIL ACTIVATES IMMEDIATE DROUGHT SUPPORT MEASURES

Parkes Shire Council will activate immediate drought support measures locally, following a Drought Committee resolution made yesterday.

Councillors voted to adopt a suite of drought relief initiatives, which include immediate access to domestic and stock water free of charge for rural residents from Council's stand pipes. Cr Neil Westcott suggested "these measures should be implemented immediately".

Council will also investigate options for subsidising potable water cartage.

Parkes Shire Mayor, Councillor Ken Keith OAM said, "we recognise that we must do something at a local level, to help our local agricultural sector."

"While these measures aren't a long-term solution, they will provide some short-term relief for our farming families doing it tough."

Additionally, as a small token of assistance to drought affected community members, Council unanimously supported the resolution to provide free entry to all shire pools for the coming season.

Cr Bill Jayet believed this gesture might provide some small respite and a friendly gathering place for families. "With the drought intensifying, our farmers, businesses and residents will all be affected."

"Opening our pools in Parkes, Trundle, Tullamore and Peak Hill free of charge throughout the coming season, could serve to provide some respite from the day-to-day distress of this worsening drought," he said.

On Sunday, Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull visited the Central West to announce an additional drought assistance package, which included an allocation of \$1 million to 36 Councils throughout New South Wales.

"This period of prolonged drought has already had a flow-on effect for businesses and the whole community, so it is imperative we take a holistic approach moving forward," the Mayor added.

"Council will host a community forum in the coming weeks to discuss how the money can be applied for best effect across the Parkes Shire."

"Landholders, agri-businesses and local support organisations are encouraged to attend to provide ideas and suggestions."

The Mayor will visit Canberra later this week as part of the CENTROC Drought Committee delegation to proactively lobby the government for further assistance.

"I will also be lobbying for the reinstatement of a Parkes based Rural Financial Counsellor to improve access to services and support for our immediate community," concluded the Mayor.

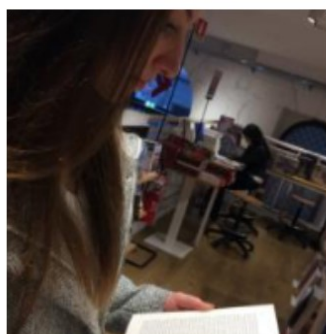

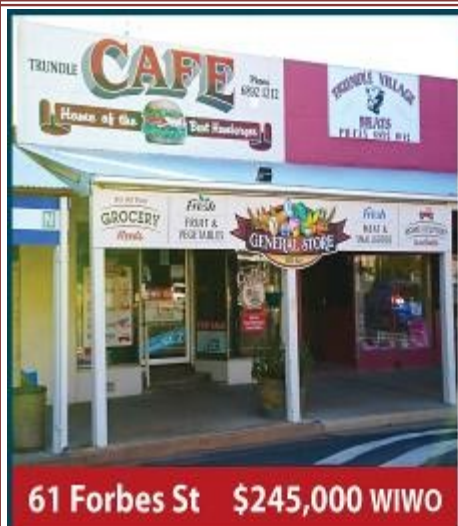
