

Principal's Message

This week is extremely busy again, with students being exposed to a range of activities to broaden their knowledge and experience base beyond the core curriculum. On Monday, Forbes Catholic Care is visiting to start the process of K-4 students constructing invitations for a significant male in their life to share their classroom experiences. This process will culminate in our *Dad's in Schools* day in week 4 of this term. I believe it is vitally important that males are active and visible in a child's education. This reinforces to our children that the significant males in their life, value education because they are willing to be involved in the process. I do not define a dad as purely biological. As Jimmy Barnes recently described, he was born James Vincent Swan but he became Jimmy Barnes. Reginald Barnes became the significant male figure and guidance in his life, not his biological father because of the quality of the man, not due to any biological link. If a child's biological father is not available for any reason, a significant male figure in their life is more than welcome to support your child.

I have been asked the question why Catholic Care is so closely involved with a Public School. This organisation is the welfare arm of the Catholic Church and does not discriminate their service based on religion. Also, as I have stated many times, Trundle Central School has more students that identify as Catholic than St Patricks, as I am sure they have a high percentage of non-catholic students attending their school. My point is, it really should not matter who delivers the service. The important thing is that Trundle Central School students are exposed to this excellent program and quality education is available in our town. Indeed, recently I listened to a podcast that argued Australia has three tiers of Public Education, traditional public, religion based and private schools that are all tax payer funded - therefore public schools. It is a hard fact for some people to comprehend, but all tax payers contribute in some way to all schools in this country. Maybe they

should all be as inclusive as Public Education considering this fact.

Year 7 vaccinations are this week. It is vitally important that your child receives the appropriate vaccinations not only to protect themselves but to protect others from the life threatening or altering conditions. The Department of Education requires evidence of vaccination status upon enrolment because of our systems belief that vaccination ensures the safety of all of our children.

Transition commences this week. This is for both High School transition and for Kindergarten next year. Transition is not only a chance for students to formally meet their teachers for 2019 but also to gain an understanding of the expectations of attending this school. It is approximately 37 steps between the primary building and high school facilities. However, the teaching style, expectations and culture is vastly different because of the nature of the curriculum and the fact students have multiple teachers in High School. Therefore transition is vitally important for year 6 students as well.

Overall, school numbers continue to increase however we have plenty of room in Primary as we are self funding a fourth class in line with our focus on early Literacy and Numeracy development and extension. At this stage the average Primary class will be around 11 to 14 students so parents can be assured of quality individual attention to your child's learning and social needs. Trundle Central School is in a privileged position because all five of our Primary teachers are experienced, skilled and dedicated to improving the educational access of your children. Indeed, I had six years as a consultant in both Wagga Wagga and Moree regions and I can honestly say I did not see a better group of primary teachers in any school.

University of Canberra will be visiting our school on Thursday of this week. This is to continue the university's research which commenced last year into how country students solve mathematical problems. I was keen to invite the university because I believe it is important that we understand our students' learning styles to improve our targeting of curriculum and lesson delivery. As a school I believe we should never be afraid to invite outside eyes into the school to appraise and review

our processes. If indeed the research does indicate that our students attack problems differently this will influence our assessment and teaching style.

The South Coast Concert Band visited our school last week. This is group of talented musicians from smaller schools along the south coast of NSW. The quality of this band was exceptional and our students certainly enjoyed the concert. I think it is vitally important that our students are exposed to the programs that happen in other schools and regions. Our school cannot operate in isolation and our students need to be exposed to what other students are achieving. This allows perspective and hopefully inspires them to improve. Continuous improvement is not only in formal testing such as NAPLAN, but exposure to examples of excellence is also vitally important. It is similar to when a team like Manly or Parramatta travel to the Shire to play the Sharks. It is a learning and humbling experience for those teams.

The Primary excursion is over for another year. Many tired but happy students returned on Friday. I thank staff and the accompanying parents for giving up their time to allow your children to experience this excursion. Contrary to some people's belief teachers do not receive overtime or time in lieu when these activities occur. It is purely because of staff goodwill that these activities occur. Many schools are struggling to run overnight excursions because of the enormous commitment required to supervise children on overnight excursions. I hope the community appreciates the quality of staff in this outstanding public school. This year alone students have had a snow excursion, Zoo Snooze and opportunity to visit China. This is part of our commitment that our students will have every opportunity to experience different locations, activities and cultures.

On Tuesday, a correspondent for China Daily News will be visiting our school. This is the English Language news service of China. This follows our interview on BBC world service last term. This is massive publicity for our school and region. However, as I explained to students if our school was not a quality educational setting these international media organisations would not be interested beyond a novelty interview.

There was also a lovely article about our 'Pets as Therapy dog' Ajax in The Land newspaper on Thursday last week. To me, making The Land newspaper is a real thrill because it was often purchased and in our house when I was a child and my father rarely had time to read any other paper. Also last Thursday I was interviewed again by Richard Glover on ABC Drive about the drought and the country in general. During this interview, I enquired whether Sydney people actually realised the massive difference between what farmers are receiving for products and the supermarket price. I went into a supermarket in Central Sydney and a leg of Lamb was \$38. What did the farmer receive??

I recently wrote about the amount of public and private services that have been removed from country towns. A list was included that I was aware of from my conversations with long term residents. Apparently there is much more. The need to maintain services for our kids is actually the reason why I am taking every opportunity to promote this town in the media. If we are silent and accepting of service reduction it will continue. Thousands of Sydney people went to protest about advertisement on the Opera House because they grasped their political power. Maybe it is time as a community we became more vocal to save services in our towns.

It has rained. Everything is solved isn't it??


5 big woofs to all the Primary students who were happy and well behaved on the Dubbo excursion despite wet weather at times.






