Principal's Message

This week is Musica Viva on Tuesday, Volunteer's morning tea and Super 8's cricket on Wednesday and Transition on Thursday.

Unfortunately, I will not be available for the Volunteer's morning tea as I will be travelling to Dubbo with the Super 8's cricketers. We have three sides competing and I am not prepared to release three teachers due to the cost of replacement teachers, and the disruption caused by this amount of teachers out of the school. My absence should not in any way be interpreted as not appreciating and respecting the enormous contribution of the volunteers, both at this school and the community in general. It may, however, confirm to some staff that I am the most easily replaced member of staff. Whilst I am at the cricket, I will be looking for talent for the current Australian team. It appears, all you need is a backbone, ability to watch the ball and fine sandpaper.

Last week on Tuesday, Mr Greg Navavro, Australian correspondent for China Daily News, the English language media servicing China, visited our school. Greg has covered Presidential elections in the United States so he has vast experience. Greg commented without prompting how relaxed and happy the environment is at Trundle Central School and how well-mannered the students are. I despair how narrow the parameters are when school performance is judged. School environment and culture cannot be graphed and is difficult to place a value added index on, but it is vitally important for your kids.

In this issue is an advertisement for the Dubbo School of Distance Education Preschool. Quality Preschool education is vital for the emotional and cognitive development of children before they enter school. I encourage parents of 3 to 4 year olds to investigate this Preschool service. Research is very clear in regards to the benefits of

interactive play for cognitive, fine motor and social skills such as turn taking. Trundle Central School in partnership with Catholic Care, host a playgroup. Information contained also in this newsletter.

The school in partnership with Red Cross will be offering the Save a Mate Program. This program allows young people to develop strategies to identify risk taking behaviours, both in themselves and their friends. Topics that will be covered include drink driving and ICE addiction. Current research indicates that the easy availability of ICE is not encouraging significantly more people to experiment with drugs. The highly addictive nature of this drug, if it becomes the drug of choice, does cause considerably more physical and emotional damage. Country areas, unfortunately, seem to have high rates of ICE addition. High School students will receive a note this week.

Next week is our *Dads in School* activities for K-4 students. All dads or a significant male in a child's life should have received an invitation to attend the activities. It is very important that children see that dads and mums are in partnership in relation to education.

Life Education has agreed to provide their service for free to Trundle for the next two years. This organisation has a long history of providing educational programs and I welcome their support. Life Education management has been a pleasure to negotiate with, displaying both compassion and professionalism. This is another service for your children, we have been able to return to the town.

This school regularly subsidises the cost of activities. The drought fund raising has slightly increased our capacity to help parents afford the cost of excursions and other activities. The cost of Musica Viva will be 40% subsidised by drought relief, and the cost of travel to the Stage 6 Study days will be 100% subsidised this term. It is impossible for the school to subsidise completely the cost of all activities because of the number of students attending this school and the vast range of activities we offer. If we were a school that only offered one or two activities per year, we could make the gesture of making them free of charge, but this is not possible with the amount of

opportunities available at Trundle Central School. Most extracurricular activities offered at this school are less than a packet of cancer sticks or slab of beer, so this puts it in perspective, I feel.

In addition to the subsidised activities, the school is currently making book packs for High School students. This is because of the generosity of Blacktown schools and Mr Paul Cole. This will, I hope, allow all High School students to start 2019 with the basic essentials. Parents will still need to buy some specialist items to supplement the packs. I am very happy that we are in a position to do this because this tier of the three tiers of Public Education in Australia believes in all students having the ability to access education on an equal basis.

The school also has a number of school hats to distribute in the near future. These will make excellent back up hats when children misplace their school hat. It is amazing how many times students state that someone has their hat. Then the hat is found on the back oval, surprisingly where the child left it, despite the ability of school hats to grow legs and run away. This generation of children have grown up in a throwaway society, so I believe they are less careful with their property. When I started school in the 70's it was very possible that you were wearing a uniform or carrying a school bag that was handed down through the family, because that is what families did. I can also remember when those school products were made in Australia. Wow, remember when Australia actually made something besides a hole in the ground and an endless supply of former Prime Ministers?

The school has decided to purchase sunglasses for each student in K-4 next year. Current research indicates, children from three years should wear sunglasses to protect themselves from damage caused from exposure to UV light. The company *School Shades Australia* is providing the sunglasses to us for a heavily subsidised price. Parents who are interested in purchasing sunglasses for older children can contact the school. If we have enough interested people, we can negotiate a bulk price. Once issued, the school will take NO responsibility for lost or broken glasses and replacement is at the expense of parents, if they wish. The Kinder students who modelled the

sunglasses last week looked cooler than Michael Jackson did. Look him up students, he was not an actor but starred in a thriller. He even had magic powers because he could change colour.

I hope, the massive generosity of the Australian people in donating money and supplies to our school, does not create a false economy. Donations of school supplies and money will stop when Trundle is out of the news. It is happening already, so parents will not have the luxury of free travel and book packs in the future. The flow of donations reinforces my belief that promoting this great town is essential. The recent census identified the vast majority of residents in Trundle are older than 50 years of age. If we cannot attract new families to Trundle, the cycle of permanent population decline will continue. Maybe when the Middle Trundle Road is fully sealed, Trundle could be marketed as a lifestyle destination. Certainly, we have better information coverage than the major telecommunications networks. Start a rumour at the start of your mineral water at the club, by the time you are finished, it is old but bigger news.

This school takes student safety very seriously. That is why we practice lock downs and evacuations. Recently, we have had parents enter the school by jumping across the fence to place hats etc in children's bags, despite the gate being clearly marked that all parents need to report to the front office. This is not acceptable behaviour and needs to stop. Trundle is a very safe community but I will not compromise student and staff safety by reducing standards. If any person repeatedly enters the school inappropriately, I will place an Inclosed Lands Order upon them, making it a chargeable offence to enter the school. Parents who are not complying with the expectation of reporting to the front office, can be 100 percent sure, that I will report their behaviour to the police.

Recently I read survey results identifying that most teenagers cannot perform simple household tasks or cook a basic meal. I cannot believe this as public schools run excellent cooking and nutrition lessons and this school offers extra opportunities in the form of interest electives. What we have seen, is an increase in children who are indulged to the extent that it is not a question of cannot but

Will not. My mother had a perfect cure for her children not wanting to cook a meal, It was called hunger. If we over indulge children, we kill emotional resilience. I am dismayed at the number of children who lack mental toughness because they have been allowed to develop a blame mentality to justify lack of determination and resilience. A challenge is seen as an excuse to retreat or ring mum or dad to help / get them out of it. School sick bays are full of children who, to their detriment, have been allowed to invent mystery aliments or illnesses to allow them to opt out of challenges.

A message I repeatedly express in this forum is that children should not be exposed to adult concepts. In my career, I have had six year olds graphically recall the scenes from adult movies such as Wolf Creek. This was because parents and friends were watching it when children where in the room. Children do not have the cognitive and emotional development to differentiate fiction from reality. In short, exposing children to this type of a movie is in my opinion a form of child abuse, therefore I will always report to community services. This type of parenting decision should amaze me, but after 26 years in education, I can honestly say, it does not. Another worrying trend is, parents discussing adult concepts, issues, emotions or problems in front of young children. Schools often have children with a level of knowledge far exceeding their age. Because of technology, childhood is becoming shorter, which I believe is robbing children of something that is very precious, the ability to dream. Children should know about the treasure at the end of the rainbow, rather than the rumours about the family at the end of the street.

I am not a parenting expert because there is no such thing. Indeed, when I wake up in Trundle to the relaxing sound of somebody's sewage pump malfunction or a prize hunting dog barking and pulling the two metres of chain around the trench it has worn in the ground, I look in the mirror and realise that I have made many parenting mistakes. Yes, the person in the mirror is usually the blame for children's issues, not the school, media or exwives or husbands. However, 26 years of teaching has given me some insight into child behaviour as well. Thankyou to Ronnie Jones jnr for thinking of the school and donating some goal post pads from the Boomers. This will save the school buying pads for the second basketball court. What an exceptional community man the big fellow is.

I cannot find the origin of the word Trundle. Does it mean town of the useless barking dog or town of the over opinionated school Principal?

From your Community Nurse ...

An article from NRMA's Open Road Magazine (September/October 2018). (There was a lovely picture of NRMA Director Fiona Simpson included in this article - but it wouldn't scan). So included is a picture of a good year.

NRMA DIRECTOR FOR the Townsend region, Fiona Simson, is also president of the National Farmers' Federation and says the difficult thing about droughts is that they're insidious.

"We don't know when they're going to start or when they're going to finish and they affect different people in very different ways," Ms Simson says. "It's very difficult to prepare for such a long period without any income."

Both federal and state governments have now announced extensive drought-relief packages for eligible farming communities. Ms Simson says these measures, as well as those offered by charitable organisations, are incredibly welcome.

"At the end of the day, the only silver bullet is rain, and while we wait for Mother Nature to deliver, these packages are welcomed to assist our farmers doing it tough.

"Droughts affect not just farmers, but small businesses like freight operators, stock and station agents, even supermarkets and coffee shops. When you're a freight contractor who transports wheat, but you know there's no wheat in the ground, you have to make alternative arrangements, which could even mean moving your family out of the area you call home."

A NSW Business Chamber survey of businesses in regional areas of the state found the drought had negatively impacted 84 per cent. Almost 70 per cent of affected businesses indicated their local economy had been weakened and 80 per cent said cash flow had been adversely affected.

Ms Simson says she has heard first-hand of many small, local businesses doing it tough, and they desperately need an economic boost from visitors. "When visiting regional towns that are so affected, it's a great place to spend money," she says.

"Go to the small coffee shops, buy fuel at the family-run service stations, stay the night in a local motel and enjoy a meal at the pub - that's how these communities need your help."

And while donating to charities was indeed a great way to lend a hand, Ms Simson says people in the city needed to understand the importance of supporting Aussie farmers.

"We're really grateful for the huge community support that's already been shown, and they can continue that by remembering Aussie farmers when buying their groceries. People need to be telling their retailers that they want to buy local, not imported fruit and vegetables, dairy and meat."

Ms Simson adds that, while Australian agriculture faced a drought on average every 20 years, she's confident they will emerge stronger than ever. "But in the meantime, we're really grateful for community support and we all hope and pray for rain," she says.
