Principal's Message

This week is Save a Mate Monday, Year 10 Western Access Program Orientation Tuesday, Senior Dinner Wednesday and Transition Thursday. Another busy week at this outstanding public school. The WAP orientation is important as the model used for instruction through WAP is unique. Study through video conferencing has advantages because of the availability of a co-teacher, smaller numbers and it allows students to develop a high degree of independence. However, success does require a higher level of intrinsic motivation because lessons are often self-directed. WAP also has systems and processes that students will have to learn additional to the requirements of the mainstream HSC in order to be successful. This school can boast that every student who has completed the HSC has progressed to full time employment or further study over the last 5 years which I believe is an achievement we should be proud of.

On Sunday, we had over 20 students attend the Remembrance Day Service. This is an outstanding effort considering the amount of students that rely on the school bus to get into town. I think it is vitally important that we acknowledge the sacrifice of those in the past that allows us the security and prosperity we enjoy now. The events in Melbourne last week can make us question our personal safety but we should always remember the gifts of this great country. Trundle has a few human potholes but we are a long way from a terrorist hotspot so we should always appreciate the advantages this town allows.

It is vitally important that students are given a high level of support. However, I also passionately believe in maintaining the integrity of the Higher School Certificate. Therefore, after extensive consultation with teachers and executive, I will declare a senior student's position vacant if I believe they are not maintaining a consistent diligent effort. This will mean they will not be able

to complete the Higher School Certificate at this school. If your child receives a warning letter, I have commenced this process and it is now the responsibility of the student to change work and attendance patterns. As I have wrote many times usually the cause and solution can be found to most problems by just standing in front of the mirror.

One of the most worrying trends I have seen with young people is the blame mentality. What I mean is statements such as: I was not selected because the coach did not like me or I am being picked on by my teacher. Obviously, I was not selected for Australia for a Kangaroo tour because of a conspiracy against country players. It had nothing to do with the almost total lack of talent.

I often wonder if young people's lives are more complex or just different. The increasing rates of mental health problems in youth indicate that possibly, their lives could be more complex. Alternatively, we could have grown up as a nation and are now recognising and accepting mental health conditions. These conditions should be accepted just the same as we acknowledge asthma or diabetes but I fear we have a way to go as people still whisper the diagnosis of depression or anxiety but use a full voice for other conditions.

However, some perfectly healthy individuals constantly use the excuse of a tough life. Ultimately everyone has a person or event in their life that negatively affects them emotionally, spiritually or physically. The challenge is how people react to the situation. Do we allow ourselves to be dragged into the gutter with the human trash or rise above the adversity and break the cycle for our children? That is the question many young people will have to ask in their lives, some countless times. I realise life is often more complex than that but ultimately, it is about choices.

Formal assessment and curriculum such as the Higher School Certificate I believe is only part of the learning a school should provide. I am very proud of our Interest Electives and School to Work program. These programs allow students opportunities to develop work ready skills, physical fitness or an outlet for creativity. Art, Singing, Drama and PE should be viewed at the same level as Mathematics or Science, not lower order skills, just different.

Recently, Jason Lowe under the guidance of Mr Richard John Grady has restored his grandfather's motorcycle. It gives me great pleasure to witness this level of achievement and I am sure this brings pleasure to his whole family. Next week, the lengths Jacko and Jason went in this project will be explained.

I have many proud moments at this school. Last week, yet again, provided me with a proud principal /dad moment. Emily Harper sings *Happy Birthday* numerous times a term to students which I find very special from a high school student because many are too cool for school. Last week, all secondary students took to the stage and belted out *Happy Birthday* to Emily. High fees, a big gate and fancy uniforms do not create that type of school culture and feel of belonging. Well done to all involved. I wonder which graph I use in the Annual School Report to record this.

Congratulations to the staff members who have cut their hair in support of Mrs Ann Marie Taylor our office manager who is beginning her battle with cancer. The hair will be donated to make wigs for cancer patients. I offered but I was told a skin graft is not necessary. Bit mean, I would have thought. Research states that a positive attitude and support of friends is important in the recovery process. This cancer has not got a chance.

Ajax our 'Pets as Therapy' dog is making slow progress, which is to be expected considering the extent of his injuries. All money raised through cash donations will be deposited into a separate fund that two people will need to approve before funds can be spent. This will ensure accountability of the money so generously donated by members of the public and hopefully remove the need for people to question the fund which is disappointing. Our school to work students will start to build a cage for his return as he cannot move around for at least eight weeks. His return is most likely in a couple of weeks. I intend to invite Mel from Prime television to cover his return to Trundle as she has been a great supporter of this school and many genuine, caring people have been touched and saddened by his accident. Local news is an effective forum to let people know of his return and progress.

The thinking outside the square that I encourage / demand from staff and the numerous extra

opportunities offered at this school exposes myself and staff to criticism. I have been disappointed some comments about the school's 'Pets as Therapy' dog from people that are ill-informed about his role within the school. If we did not try anything new such as Ajax, we would live in a world of minimal risk and stress. However, that is not a world I am prepared to tolerate because I passionately believe that our students deserve the school to be innovative and calculated risk takers. Trundle is often a town of a surplus of opinions but unfortunately often a deficit of facts. Sometimes I would like people to ask the person telling the story who are 'they' who have told you because many stories start with 'they tell me' well who is they????

The sunglasses that drought funding has allowed us to purchase for K-4 students should be here this week. Again, this is an innovative idea that will help our children move to the next stage of sun safe, eye protection from extreme UV light. The sunglasses have a space for the students name to be placed. The school will treat sunglasses the same as any piece of property; we will encourage students to look after them but take no responsibility for lost or broken glasses.

On Friday last week, I received an email from Ed Cowan former Australian test cricketer. Through his sponsor, GNsports, he is donating the following high quality cricket equipment to our school:

- 2 Kaboom 3I youth ready play bats.
- 1 pair of youth left hand batting gloves
- 1 pair of youth right hand batting gloves
- 2 pairs of batting pads
- 2 GN Elite Thigh pads
- 2 Junior Elite Navy helmets
- 6 white shield Leather cricket balls.

This equipment is worth several hundred dollars and is far in excess of what the school could afford in one purchase. This generous donation allows our students to compete on an equal basis with wealthier schools and maybe could be the difference between a child taking up sport or choosing to be the couch laying, video gaming champion of Trundle. A highly sought after position with a quality field. This is another example of you do not ask you cannot get, something I will never be accused of as long as I am Principal of this school.

On Tuesday last week, I visited Matthew Pearce Public School at Baulkham Hills. This school has 1500 students and is 70 % English as a second language. This school has donated over seven thousand dollars to our school and we have formed a very positive ongoing relationship. A very positive outcome from this prolonged drought is, both our and their students are exposed to different cultures and physical environments. If we allow students knowledge of different cultures and belief systems we naturally reduce racism because a very high percentage of racism is generated through ignorance.

Looking for a person named 'They' as I am always looking for the fountain of all knowledge.

When the orange flags are displayed, motorists by law must stop their vehicle at the stop line and wait until all pedestrians on or entering the crossing have safely crossed the road.



PEDESTRIANS CROSSING

Walk between the two red and white posts on each side of the road and keep within that area.

Croft Street, Trundle.

Woof Woof awards:

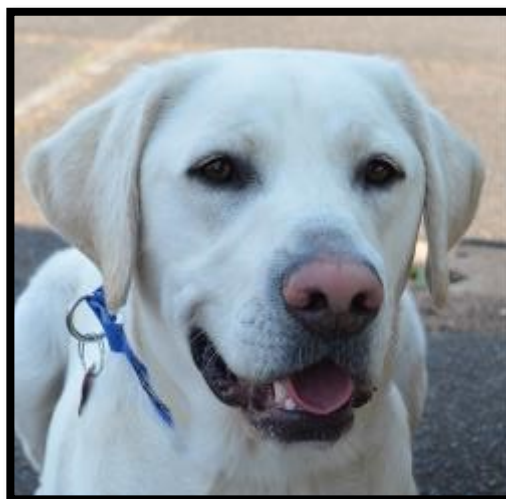

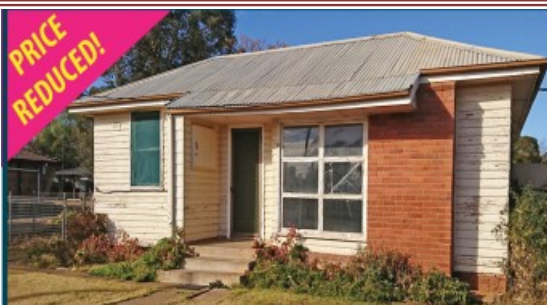
