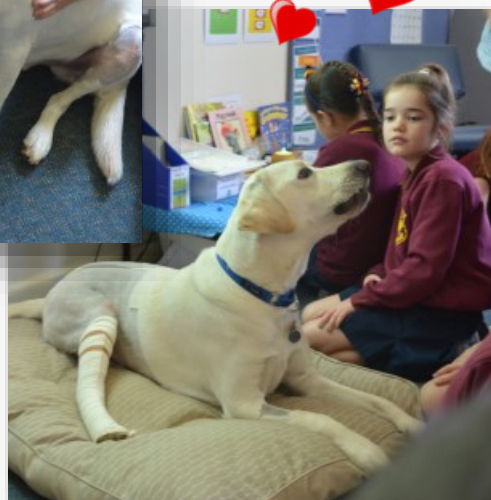

# Principal's Message

This week is another incredibly busy week at this outstanding public school. Life Education Van will be visiting Monday and Tuesday, Primary intensive swimming all week, Transition, Donut Day and Gobondery Shield hosted by Trundle is Thursday. The pace is not slowing as we move closer to the end of the season, we are just gearing up for a big finish throughout the final series. Something Parramatta yet again could not achieve. Bring back Ray Price, I hear he is driving a bus on the Gold Coast, apart from becoming hypnotised by the goal posts at times he was a champion. That man was only hungry for success and played for the pride of the club, not like some of the show ponies in the modern game.

Secondary exams are over for another year. I am very happy that this school implements a variety of assessment measures to determine the grades on reports. The old 1950's thinking of one standardised exam determining student performance for the year is thankfully gone because it was, I believe, demoralising and dangerous for students. Even the HSC now is 50 percent made up of internal school assessments. Reports are the next big ticket item on the calendar so teachers are polishing off the howevers and buts for use. 'However' or 'but' are the most comforting or dangerous words in any report. John struggled with the imagery contained in Shakespeare, however / but he maintained high levels of concentration and effort. 'However', allows the possibility of a new motorbike for Christmas. Continuing on the Christmas theme. This year the school will make some effort to brighten up this difficult year with Christmas lights. We are not celebrating the religious significance of the day but the end of a difficult year. I thank Mrs Kim Williams

and Mr Grady for making an effort to brighten up our lives during the festive session.

Last week, we hosted the Parkes Rotary Club members and Young Rotary Club PCYC driving simulator. This machine simulates actual driving conditions but also the extra safety concerns of drunk driving and texting. I hope that this machine has been a bit of a reality check for some of our young drivers. The obvious and continuous problem is, young people are obtaining their licence when their brains have not fully developed the sense of fear and ability to completely rationalise the consequence of their actions. Drive fast with my mates in the car equals to the teenage brain: 'I am so cool I could even pull off an eighties mullet.' To a developed, rational older brain, it equals this action could cause a crash, devastate a community and change my future forever. It is ironic that we are asking young people to do complex tasks such as driving, voting and end of school exams even though emotionally, they are not equipped for it.

Congratulations to all involved in the promotional video 'The Pied Piper of Trundle' that began as an interest elective. The video is high quality and the skills developed throughout the project will allow all students to enjoy film, music and drama into their adult life. The video will be screened at the school's Presentation Night. Thank you to John Lagerlow for insisting on excellence, rather than just getting it done. The skills John brings to the town are an asset to the whole community. The Staging Post provides an alternative to the club, pub or private parties, something that just gives our town that little edge over other nearby towns. I also attended the preview of the Tales of Trundle video, another amazing effort from all involved in the film society.

Still on promotional videos. Last week, Trundle Central School was the feature school on the Department's various social media forums, including Twitter, Facebook, YouTube and the website. Wow, when you are on YouTube, the Oscars are just an excuse to frock up. Well done to Miss Fitzsimmons and Mrs Bridger for their contributions to this excellent production. The theme of the video is every child is valued at this school. I passionately believe this is true. However, it does not mean a child can behave in any way

that they choose and not take responsibility for their actions. Ultimately, we live and prosper predominately through choices we make. A former mentor of mine constantly said: "Only we can control our reactions to a situation even when the situation is out of our control".

On Saturday night, our hard working dedicated P&C conducted another successful fund raising activity for the school. It was another outstanding success because of the professionalism and innovation of Rhonda Grady and her hard working team. Thank you to the community of Trundle for once again supporting this hard working team and this outstanding public school.

Last week was the annual White Ribbon day across Australia. Violence against women is a national disgrace. Domestic violence continues because people are afraid to talk about it and even justify violence at times. Often, the innocent victims of domestic violence are children. I have seen in my career many children permanently damaged through the actions of adults. The greatest and most lasting damage is children believing that adults solve problems through violence. Domestic violence is not only physical. The hidden forms of domestic violence include emotional torment, removal of power in the decision making process or depriving a partner financially. This school will continue to support the White Ribbon day.

It is vitally important that parents support the school by insisting that students attend school up to and including the last week of school. The Education Act clearly states that all students between the age of 6 and 17 years should attend school every day the school is operational and for the whole day.

Australia is still the lucky country with high quality public education, universal health care through Medicare and a welfare safety net. My question always is: 'Why do so many people fail to appreciate the gifts of this country?' Our lifestyle is the envy of many countries because of the taxpayers toil. A constant message to students is that you need to contribute rather than leech off the hard work of others who are generating prosperity for this country. This does not mean every person needs to achieve to the highest level academically. What it does mean is, every person

needs to acknowledge that they have a responsibility socially and financially to the wider community not only to themselves. The men in the trenches of Gallipoli certainly understood this responsibility. I often wonder if community responsibility is still as strong in Australia. Maybe the answer from people now is, 'sure mate I could have your back if needed but I need to check my job description and my WHS induction manual or even better the YouTube clip before I can give you a definite answer.'

Pambula Rotary Club visited our school on Friday. This group of people certainly understand community service and responsibility. They didn't come to Trundle to help for publicity nor recognition. A conversation, I certainly had with members of the club was around the long term sustainability of towns such as Trundle. The drought has undoubtedly allowed us to be in the media to a greater extent because of the short and long term effects, but other factors are causing rural decline. Lack of jobs and opportunity for youth is, I believe, the critical factor that will determine if towns such as Trundle are sustainable. Good people such as the members of the Pambula Rotary Club have the political power to lobby governments and keep our issues active rather than two minutes of national attention and then forgotten.

The great game of Rugby League again has been tarnished by the alleged behaviour of one of the stars. The media loves this type of scandal because the mud generated can be equally thrown across all individuals due to the alleged actions of a few or in this case one. However, the game of Rugby League is not only about the elite but all people who play and support, good people who are just as important to the game as the stars. The success of the Boomers and Sunflowers not only provides a distraction and social outlet during the session but an avenue for aspiration for potential players. It is very difficult to succeed if the grassroots infrastructure such as a club is not available.

Ajax returned to school for a visit on Thursday last week. He is recovering quickly but still needs another operation in the near future. Thank you to Forbes Vet clinic for the excellent quality of care Ajax is receiving. He will be back in the New Year,

### PARKES ELVIS FESTIVAL ENTERS NSW TOURISM HALL OF FAME

Rounding out a fabulous year for the Parkes Elvis Festival, the event has been named the best festival in the State at the 2018 NSW Tourism Awards.

The 2018 Festival was named winner of the Festivals and Events category at a gala celebration held at Luna Park in Sydney on Thursday 22 November.

Having won the same category for three consecutive years, the Festival was also inducted into the NSW Tourism Hall of Fame.

The annual awards program celebrates and recognises groups that demonstrate excellence in tourism, services and experiences across New South Wales.

Festival Director Cathy Treasure said, "to be inducted into the Hall of Fame is the icing on the cake for what has been the most successful year to-date for the Parkes Elvis Festival."

"This is the third time Parkes Elvis Festival has won this award, which is recognition of all the hard work and dedication of our fantastic volunteers, supporters and staff who have made the Festival what it is today."

Parkes Elvis Festival was one of six finalists in the Festivals and Events category, taking home the title ahead of the Australian Celtic Festival, Canowindra International Balloon Challenge, Deni Ute Muster, Eat the Street Lismore and Woolgoolga Curryfest.

Parkes Shire Mayor, Councillor Ken Keith OAM said this is a stellar achievement for a community generated event that has significant economic impacts for Parkes and the wider Central NSW region.

"From a one-night only event drawing a few hundred Elvis enthusiasts, to offering more than 120 events across five days - the Parkes Elvis Festival is testament to our wonderful community who have cemented Parkes as a premier tourist destination."

The 2018 Festival attracted more than 25,000 visitors, had a global media reach of 200 million and injected \$13M into the regional economy.

Parkes Elvis Festival will now progress to the national level at the QANTAS Australian Tourism Awards to be held in Launceston on Friday 1 March 2019, where it will be judged against the best of the best throughout the country.


