# Principal's Message

Welcome back to all students and staff for the 2019 school year. I especially welcome our new Kinder and Year 7 students and our new staff. This year we have the largest Year 7 and Year 11 cohort for a considerable period. An excellent endorsement of this school. Overall, the school continues to grow but I have been disappointed with losing some students, therefore the expected 130 will need to be revised down, with some possible staffing implications.

Trundle Central School welcomes new staff. New staff are exciting because they bring new ideas to their roles. Our new staff are:

Miss Ranger: English / History Ms Curtis: Science, Agriculture, Mathematics Miss Waterford: Primary Mrs Helen Gray: Art Mrs Anna Gray: returns from maternity leave for Primary release from face to face.

Year 11/12 students study through The Western Access Program. This unique program provides our Year 11/12 students with opportunities for a level of individual support not available outside this program. Every student studying through WAP receives core instruction through video conference but also co-teacher time for each subject at their local school. This means, it is the norm in this school, that stage 6 students will have individual access to a trained teacher in that subject, rather than being placed in a large class. In addition, a trained teacher for supervision and support always staffs our senior room. In 27 years with the department, I have never seen a more supportive and inclusive model. The Western Access Program model, I believe, is a critical factor in all students who graduated from Trundle Central School over the last five years, successfully progressing to full time employment or further study.

Last year was an outstanding year in terms of the student outcomes achieved. However, it is not good enough and the job is far from finished. We must have the goal of continuous improvement across all areas. I spoke to the students on Wednesday about the Kaizen (Japanese for continuous) theory of small continuous improvement across all areas rather than setting unrealistic, stressful goals. If students and staff are in a Kaizen mindset, it creates enormous improvement across the whole school. The human brain, if confronted with unrealistic, unachievable expectations can freeze, almost shut down but a sequence of small achievable goals stimulates the brain into immediate, sustainable action. In short, run a marathon one-step at a time. The Japanese have been reasonably successful in re-building after the devastation of WWII, so I think the Kaizen model could have credibility. Maybe this theory should be published in the magazine *Just* Life. Alongside Keith and Nicole breaking up for the tenth time or 'I think my partner is a serial killer' or my favourite, 'I just found out my wife is my sister.'

Observant people would have noticed, the original school building and the hospitality room are being painted. I am very pleased that my application to have these buildings painted was successful. The next step is too, progressively have the rest of the school painted. We deserve to have our children in the best possible environment and I believe I am a custodian of this school as a community asset for future generations. This involves handing the buildings back in better condition after I retire or die (hopefully in that order). Other improvements happening in the near future include an extensive upgrade of our computer network including three additional Wi-Fi access points for outdoor classrooms and an air conditioning upgrade. Ouotes have been obtained for a new bus. The problem at the moment is, the location of the decimal point, not the idea for a new bus. The various tables of knowledge will argue that students do not need the best possible airconditioning. Happy to discuss the merits of upgrading facilities. Just hook up the sulky and come in for a chat. As long as I am Principal of this school, I will actively seek and embrace any opportunity to provide better facilities because other schools have these assets. I will be happy with just a little better than the rest.

In some exciting news. Last year in partnership with the P&C I applied for a grant to establish a fitness circuit in the vacant land adjacent to the tennis / netball court. This grant has been successful, so this year we will include a six station fitness circuit to our already impressive recent sporting upgrades. If we receive more rain to establish some soil moisture, we will be planting grass around this area, in preparation for the construction of the fitness track.

Many years ago, the bus shelter was removed from outside the school. As a project, in partnership with Parkes Shire Council, our School to Work students will assist in the construction of a new shelter. I do not know if we desperately need a bus shelter. However, the opportunity is there, so embrace it.

On Wednesday last week, I visited every class to remind students that this school has high expectations and as you progress through the years, these expectations increase. I do not care what happens in other schools, they do not set the standard, we do! This school is outstanding in terms of student behaviour and application but as this is the first newsletter, I think it is important that I re-state a few core expectations every student will follow:

- Our school is a hands off school. Physical violence is not tolerated.
- Uniform is an expectation. If parents cannot provide uniform, talk to the school for assistance.
- All staff and students are treated with respect. Swearing and other aggressive behaviour will not be tolerated from students, visitors or parents.
- All parents / visitors report to the front office before entering the school.
- All students behave in a fashion that allows themselves and others to learn.
- Mobile phones and other electronic devices are to be used appropriately. Cyber bullying will not be tolerated. Any incidents will be dealt with under the School Discipline and Welfare Policy and reported to police.
- Primary students are not to bring mobile phones to school.
- School and personal property is to be respected.

- Students will attend school every day the school is operational and for the whole day.
- Students need to bring permission notes and money to attend excursions unless prior arrangement with school.
- Trundle Central School is a Sun Safe School, so students wear hats.

This is not a comprehensive list. I most likely left some important expectations out. However, I do not believe any expectation of this school is unreasonable or unachievable. I believe, this school needs to be the safest physical and emotional environment possible for all children. To achieve this, we must have structure, expectations and that concept that seems controversial in our modern world, discipline. This school has high quality students and staff but we can always do better and that is what I want to achieve.

Over the summer, despite desperately missing the staff, students and the administrative tasks of managing a school, I had time to read many articles on education. You thought teenagers are wild and crazy, some of these articles were even from controversial sources! Mobile phones seem to be creating considerable controversy within schools. I view mobile phones in three ways:

- Even before the mobile phones bullying occurred in schools / society. Schools are not separate from a society, indeed in many ways they are reflections of it. The mobile phone has simply in many ways made the process of the dominant suppressing the weak more efficient. In tackling bullying, we therefore need to attack the reasons why people need to dominate others. I believe if you chiselled down into the minute brain of a bully you would find a scared person, who lacks the confidence to stand alone. Therefore, if we make our kids more resilient, the bully finds an easier target because they in themselves are weak.
- If you place a blanket ban on phones , you immediately achieve two things. The first is, you unnecessary punish those students who are using the device appropriately.

The second is, you create a situation where having a phone makes you the coolest kid in school. Similar to having a chewing gum in Sister Veronica's class in 1974. You were playing a dangerous game, but you felt like you were the coolest kid in school, despite the threat of a ruler across the knuckle and many additional prayers in church.

• The third is every generation has had some technological innovation that challenges current laws and excepted ways of behaving and thinking. The Walkman, personal computer, internet and many more. The difference is the pace of technological innovation; a level not seen in human history. My point is, the phone is here to stay. We cannot ban or suppress it, we need to manage the negatives and embrace the positives.

Those people who have taken the time to know and understand me would realise, that I take just as much pleasure in witnessing a student progress into employment as tertiary study. I am especially proud of Zac Longhurst and Amy Mallard who have both secured apprenticeships. These students will go on to be very successful in their lives, I am sure. I despair that our modern society views working physically as a lower status than white collar work. These two students will contribute to society, rather than leech off the wealth of this nation and should be congratulated.

Some very upsetting news over the holidays. I was informed of the death of Les Whiley (snr). I would like to pass on the school condolences to the family during this difficult time.

In addition, during the holidays, our school community lost in a road accident Loanna (Anna) Malliaridou mother of Stacey, George and Caytlin who attend our school. In many conversations, I had with Anna, one thing that was always abundantly evident, was her deep love for her children and her passion for giving them the best possible opportunity. In my 52 years on this planet, I still cannot understand why people are taken away from their children so suddenly, when they still have so much more to give. Big questions cannot be answered on YouTube. Do not tell a teenager.
