# Principal's Message

This week marks the end of Term One. This school has already provided your children with 25 additional extra curricula activities this term. Naturally, this week your school continues this outstanding service to your children. I heard a particularly ill-informed and amateurish comment last week from a person who has little knowledge of this school and modern educational pedagogy. The comment was that children should be learning to read, write and add up instead of doing all these extra things in school. All credible research indicates that children learn better when immersed in a variety of experiences. Also, if this school through the resources of public education does not provide additional experiences and opportunities to the children of Trundle, many will not have the opportunity. The facilities and services are just not available elsewhere in our town.

When many of us were in primary school in the late sixties, early seventies, there was not the degree of testing and remedial programs as in schools today. The level of illiteracy and ill numerate children was enormous, but it was hidden. I attended a Catholic school where classes were well over 40 students. Many children from low socio-economic or Aboriginal families simply slipped through the Literacy and Numeracy net, trapping these children in a world of limited opportunity, especially since many are still not in workforce. Our school tests and plots students along the Literacy and Numeracy progressions, approximately every five weeks. This ensures problems are quickly identified and targeted.

On Tuesday are parent-teacher interviews. The P&C will provide a sausage sizzle so you do not have to worry about dinner for the children or yourself if you do not want to. On Wednesday, Trundle is hosting the 4T's Gala Day, Thursday is the Secondary Welfare lunch, Friday our annual Cross Country in the morning, Secondary Reward Assembly at 12 noon and Easter activities conducted by the SRC in the afternoon. All students and staff should sleep well on Friday night. No need to thank us just donate to [www.hemustbekidding.com](http://www.hemustbekidding.com).

This year, we have been in many ways a victim of our own success. The Secondary Reward Trip is costing significantly more because so many more students

have reached the required level. This is a problem I am very willing to have but it will require some additional fundraising. If we cannot raise the required money the alternate trip will be an all-expenses paid excursion to Bogan Gate Hall for sausage sizzle and a performance by Bottle Top Bob the Central West bottle top spinning champion.

The school Cross Country will again be around pristine fairways of Royal Trundle Golf course. This year, I have noticed a healthy crop of catheads and other nasties during my morning 10 kilometre run twice around the course chasing the Brumbies off the course. This is why the students of Mrs Southon's class do not see them in the morning only hear them at night. Trust me students, it is a true story about the Trundle White Brumby, I would not make it up. I ask that students scrape their shoes free of these passengers before entering the school. Mr Grady has been very successful in removing these nasty surprises from our playground so we do not want them back.

Parent-teacher night is not an opportunity to score points on your child's teachers but an opportunity to discuss in partnership their progress. Also strategies for moving forward in the future. I will not tolerate any person being aggressive or rude to teachers, as every one of my staff goes beyond their job requirements to allow your children every opportunity to succeed. Naturally, parents are allowed to ask difficult questions, but it should be done in a respectful fashion. Teacher desks should be full of apples and heads full of compliments by the end of the night as I am extremely impressed with what is happening in the classrooms at the moment.

Last week was a highlight of my time in Trundle because of the people I was able to meet, both on the phone and in person. Lee and Rosey Bartlett visited from Rural Aid to investigate possible projects that this group of volunteers can complete around the community. Our school, which accepts all and educates the vast majority of students from Kinder to Yr 12 in this town, will benefit from this generosity. Possible projects include drip irrigation systems, fencing and connecting our gutters to the water storage tank. Seventy people will be visiting Trundle for three days in June to complete community and farm projects. This is a major spike economically and socially for our town from just one phone call. I suggested Rural Aid could look at installing fans into the town hall because it is the hottest place in Australia to have a Presentation Night in December. Maybe it is my motivational 3 minute speeches creating the glow across the crowd.

The answer was not 'no' from Rural Aid, so I am hoping something could come of it.

Another highlight was a connection formed with Monica Saunders Weinberg. This amazing lady through her charity has agreed to donate 100 sets of warm sheets to Trundle families, 45 sets of pyjamas and much more. These items are expensive and in a Trundle winter essential. Each primary student will be taking home some essential items in early May because of the generosity of this outstanding Australian. A cynical person may say this outstanding woman is one of the wealthiest Australians, so she can afford it. However, she does not have to give her time and money to our community. This, I believe, places her at a very high level as a human.

In yet more inspiring good news, Tzu Chi Australia has donated 6000 dollars towards the renewal of the senior room. This will allow us to bring forward this work and think bigger. I want our seniors to have an environment that encourages and rewards them for hard work and completing school. I walk in the room at present I do not see David Jones, I see Fair Dinkum Bargains. We are not a Fair Dinkum Bargains type of school so our learning environment should reflect this.

On Friday this week, Bushman's Tanks will deliver a donated water tank. This is part of our establishment of a community orchard and eventually a community vegetable garden. The orchard behind the School to Work shed will have table olives, mandarins, oranges and lemonade trees. Our students will be able to consume the fruit when ripe and the excess will be available to the community. This is another service your local public school is providing to the community.

As well as the additional fruit trees the school has purchased 24 additional shade trees. What? The former environmental vandal who cut trees down is now replacing them! No, I have not purchased an electric car that cannot be re-charged in the country and has limited range. Each year our school has a tree audit. This identifies trees that are dangerous or potentially dangerous in the future. As the Principal, I have to make a decision to conduct expensive restoration work or remove the suspect trees. A tree that is converted to a big pile of wood chip is rarely dangerous. The new trees are young and 90 of the 116 trees will produce something that we can eat.

On Friday last week, we had our clothing and shoe giveaway. Thank you to the people who took advantage of this effort by your local school. I write every week to organisations to encourage them to help our community. This is because I passionately believe a school in a country town should be involved

with helping beyond the boundaries of the classroom. This drought has increased the pace of rural decline, not caused it, so even if it rains, our community is still struggling. Country towns have seen a change in demographics (where people live) and the profitability of farming has declined. The global market for Agricultural products has not kept pace with the cost of farm inputs, dramatically affecting profitability. A fancy way of saying, farming is a hard game so I try to help. A local identity said to me last year, 'do not expect praise or a pat on the back from the community because the same people that pat you on the back one day, are kicking you in the backside the next.' The look on a child's face when they receive new shoes or a gift is my motivation, not the approval of adults or peers.

Recent visitors to our school were a group of beginning teachers. These teachers came to observe Mr Capell and Mrs Budd in the classroom. All teachers were very complimentary in regards to our school environment and the behaviour and application of our students. Again, we expect this high standard but it is refreshing to hear recognition from outside people. It is also a huge compliment to these teachers that our school was chosen, not a large High School. Sorry, bigger is always better isn't it?

One welcome but stressful visitor was the departments Auditor. The school was audited on Finance, Workplace Health & Safety and Attendance. The school received the highest rating across all these areas. The rating ranges from satisfactory through to 'grab your toothbrush you're going to the big house.' This is a credit to our staff especially Mrs Ann-Marie Taylor and Mrs Kylie Strudwick who are constantly learning new systems designed to make their life so much easier. This is even more of an achievement, considering the amount of money that has been raised for our community drought relief that has gone through the school and needed to be accounted for. Well done to all in the front office.

Last Saturday, I experienced my first seven year old birthday party when our little red headed bundle of energy turned seven. A party for seven year olds is easy. You clean up for a week, set up for a day, all for two hours of children consuming the sugar crop of North Queensland. After that, you stagger into bed exhausted at 8:00pm. In the morning, you have the pleasure of cleaning various piles of sticky mess. However, your child feeling special for a day is priceless. Thankyou to all the beautiful children who attended Scarlett's birthday.

Looking forward to her 21st, as I will be fully recovered.

## Woof Woof awards:

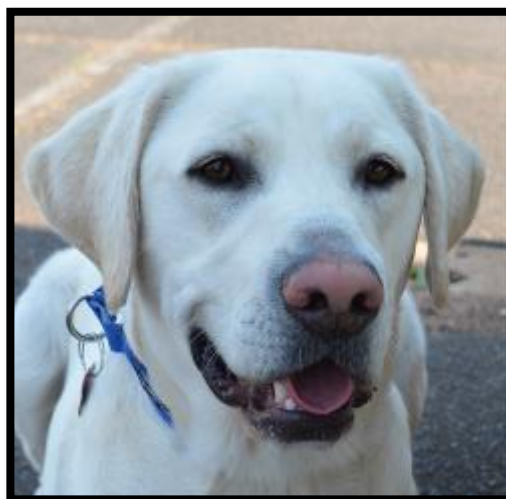

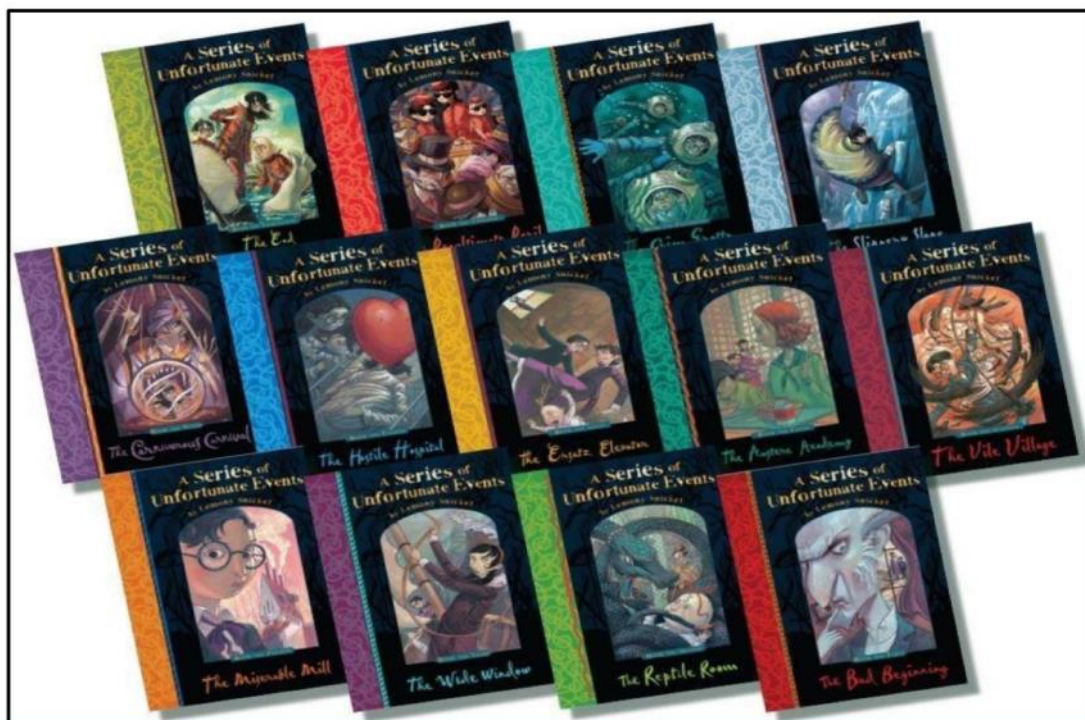


## WEEK 11

## *From Your Community Nurse... Bench or Angle Grinders ... 1*

Eye injuries and hand injuries are particularly prevalent in farm workshops. The high velocity metal produced from grinding, and exposure to a quickly spinning grinding wheel, certainly contribute to these injuries. In some instances it may be possible to substitute the grinder for a manual filing or cutting tool with which there is less risk associated. However, if this is not practicable, below are some measures that will assist in controlling the risks associated with using grinders.

### Hazard & Risk

High velocity particles that are generated during grinding may result in eye injury to both the operator and bystanders

### Risk Controls

- Ensure that all appropriate guards are in place and functional.
- Do not exceed the recommended wheel speed and size as the wheel may fly apart.
- Keep bystanders clear when grinding work is being undertaken.
- Provide and ensure the use of appropriate eye protection when grinding including goggles and/or a face shield.
