Principal's Message

This week, our school is privileged to have the volunteers from Rural Aid in our school. These outstanding people are helping us commence projects that would have taken years to complete without this much needed assistance. I believe several other community facilities in Trundle have benefited from the kind hearts and community spirit of these people. The other exciting event on this week is the Gobondery / NARRAF Soccer day in Trangie.

On Sunday night, our outstanding P&C catered for Rural Aid Volunteers. Our P&C works constantly for all the students of this school. I am extremely lucky as Principal because this group of talented individuals works cohesively in partnership with the school. Many P&C's across the state have people on committees who do not serve, but disrupt, and push a personal agenda that is often individually targeted. Our P&C members serve because of a love of this school and this community. I have complete trust in the leadership of Mrs Rhonda Grady and the processes and procedures in place to ensure accountability within the organisation. Well done to all involved. I would also like to mention Tracy Farrar, who no longer has children at this school, but can always be relied upon to assist when we need help. Tracy has a great sense of community, something that is becoming rare in this sterile society we have allowed to develop.

On Saturday last week, seventy large boxes of community drought relief products arrived from Matthew Pearce Public School. In August last year, I wrote to Matthew Pearce Principal, Kim Fawcett asking her to partner with our school. This relationship has resulted in not only product and financial support, but our students and theirs gaining a better understanding and appreciation of the diversity of this country and the strength of this nation as a community. A message of support from Matthew Pearce students is on our Facebook page. Please view and comment.

Another video clip I have had shared to our page is Neale Daniher's speech to the Melbourne Football Club players. Neale has Motor Neuron disease to which there is no cure. He is talking about what he would like his grandson Cooper to know and realise. He states some time in his grandson's life, it will be tough, but it is how you react and deal with, it is what will define your

life. Not how you conduct yourself in the good times but how you will deal with adversity and remain respectful and controlled. This is also a message I want our students to understand. Please encourage your son or daughter to view this inspirational message from a great Australian on our Facebook page.

As part of our community relief program, each family will receive in the next package a voucher for \$100 that can be spent at Bug Eyed Brats to purchase school uniform. The uniform can be purchased this year or the voucher saved to purchase uniforms for the 2020 school year. Students attending transition will also receive a uniform voucher to reduce the cost of uniform that needs to be purchased. I completely understand that school uniform costs well in excess of 100 dollars. However it is a very reasonable free kick in these difficult times.

This week, the school is purchasing a set of smart phones and apps to move into the world of virtual and augmented reality in the classroom. This will allow our students another avenue for learning and experience. This is made possible through our innovation funding and the combined talents and interests of Mr Lynn and Miss Ranger.

On Friday last week, the final approval was gained for the painting of C block. This required the heavy pruning of the hedge on the Croft Street side of the building to allow painting of the whole wall. Whilst this is not the most exciting educational development in NSW, it does bring 6 extra people into this town for a two week period. This will be another little economic boost provided by this school through effectively lobbying to improve facilities. It is vitally important for this community that this school continues to grow, prosper and support the community. This school has a salary bill of over two million dollars and the vast majority of staff choose to live in the town. Imagine, if public education was not in this town, I suspect the town would not be here as well in its current form.

Last week, I attended the Secondary Principals Council Annual Conference. This event brings together hundreds of secondary principals from across NSW to discuss current issues in education and to listen to experts in the field. This year the conference included, Jane Caro respected author and social commentator, Eddie Woo Mathematics guru, Pasi Sahlberg head of the Gonski Institute University of NSW, Sarah Mitchell NSW Minister for Education and many more. In short, to get the microphone at this conference you needed to be a leader in your field. I think it is important that I share some of the insights of these people in regards to education:

Pasi Sahlberg is one of the leaders of educational policy not only in Australia but across Europe. A summary of his insights are as follows:

- The increase in student screen time almost perfectly correlates to the increase in anxiety related disorders in teenagers.
- Since 2011, the threats of violence towards teachers from students has doubled. 32.4 % of school staff were threatened by parents in 2017.
- In 2017, 30 % of teachers were physically assaulted by students.
- In 2017, 8.9 % of teachers were physical assaulted by parents.

These are worrying statistics and I suspect many minor incidents go unreported. Pasi believes a major cause of this, is the trend in the movement of blame / responsibility away from the home onto institutions such as schools. The example he gave is, in 1970 if a student presented home with a poor report card, the statement from the parent would be to the child 'you need to improve your work'. In 2019, the statement to the school is; why are you not teaching my child properly! The blame has moved away from the individual onto the institution. This has made schools and teachers easy targets. Pasi believes this extra false accountability has reduced creativity and innovation, as teachers are afraid to fail because of the criticism of parents.

I often believe, to be innovative and bring about positive change, you have to be prepared to 'fall forward'. This means when you fail and you will, many will delight in your disappointment but you need to take what you have learnt from the experience to move forward and continue.

Pasi Sahlberg also spoke about the value of homework. Pasi believes homework has little function. Indeed, it can be damaging to students. Allowing the classroom into the home in many families is another source of family conflict. The anxieties and failures many children experience in the classroom are transferred to the home environment. This makes sense when it is viewed logically. If a student is having trouble in the classroom mastering a skill with the support of a trained teacher, transferring the work to home is not going to increase the chances of success.

The value of formal exams was also discussed at length. The current thinking is a progressive assessment using a variety of methods, which is much more effective than standardised testing. Indeed, Sweden is an education system that is regarded as one of the best in the world. Sweden does not use standardised testing but a combination of local contextually based assessments.

Many of the ideas discussed at this conference can be easily integrated into the school in some form. Some are not possible because of policy restraints or parent local choice. However, the advantage of these conferences is, it gives us an opportunity to question process and practice. I have never believed in putting the wagons in a circle and defending our way of doing things and our beliefs beyond question. If we question we improve.

Sarah Mitchell MLC visited our school two years ago. Ms Mitchell is a proud product of Gunnedah High School and public education. Ms Mitchell gave a firm commitment to rural and isolated schools whilst she is the minister. I hope the current maintenance of staffing levels continues, because I believe after this worse drought in living memory is over, I am sure we will start to grow again. If we lose staff of the quality we currently have in this school, they will be difficult to replace.

Jane Caro made many statements. Many were to massage the ego of the audience but one I believe is extremely relevant. Jane said, "public schools are responsible for educating all students. This includes the ones with disabilities, all races, religions and socio-economic groups". "When the system gets it wrong, it is heavily criticised in the media and other places. However, when other systems make a tokenistic effort by providing a scholarship to a low socio-economic students for example, they are promoted as being egalitarian and progressive". In short, these elitist systems are making a token effort to do what is expected of public education every day and being applauded for it.

SOCIAL/MOVIE NIGHTS POLICY

Social/movie nights are held at various times throughout the year to provide supervised social interaction to students of the school. Attendance at school social/movie nights is a privilege which is dependent on acceptable behaviour and cooperation from students, along with staff volunteering to supervise.

The following matters are relevant to the holding of social/movie nights at Trundle Central School.

1. Secondary social/movie nights will be organised by the Stage 3 Co-ordinator while Primary social/movie nights will be organised by the Assistant Principal. Attendance by staff at social/movie nights is voluntary. However, it is a requirement that at least 2 teachers indicate that they will be at the social/movie night before a social/movie night can be held.
2. Permission to attend social/movie nights will be granted if the student is on level 3 (secondary) level B or above as per the welfare policy. Primary students may not be granted permission to attend a social/movie night if they have been suspended prior to a social/movie night.
3. Parents / carers are welcome at all social/movie nights.
4. Notification of each social/movie night will be included on the Newsletter prior to the social/movie night being held. This will include the finishing time of each social/movie night.
5. It is expected that students will adhere to normal school standards of behaviour consistent with Trundle Central School's K-12 Welfare and Discipline Policy and Anti-bullying policy.
6. Tobacco, items that can be used as weapons and all forms of alcohol and other drugs are strictly forbidden at social/movie nights. Students found in possession of weapons or illegal drugs will be reported to police.
7. Social/movie nights will be restricted to students attending Trundle Central School.
8. In general, Secondary social/movie nights shall run from 7.30 – 10.30pm in Summer and 7.00 – 10.00pm in Winter. In general, Primary social/movie nights will start at 7.00pm and end at 9.00pm in Summer and 6.30pm – 8.30pm in Winter. Infants' social/movie nights run from 6.00 – 7.00pm in Summer and 5.30 – 6.30pm in Winter. K-6 students must be picked up from the social/movie night by a parent/carer. Students are expected to remain at the social/movie night until the conclusion of the social/movie night. If children need to leave the social/movie night early, an explanatory note from a parent / carer should be given to the teacher organising the social/movie night at school on the day of the social/movie night.
9. Students who do not attend school on the day of the social/movie night should not attend the social/movie night. School absences should be consistent with DET acceptable reasons and students who are away sick should not attend social/movie nights on that night.
10. Students who arrive later than 15 minutes after the social/movie night begins will not be admitted unless the teacher in charge has been notified prior to the social/movie night or the student brings a note from parents. Parents / carers of students not admitted will be phoned immediately before students are sent home. Students will remain under supervision if parents / carers can not be contacted.
11. Students from Trundle Central School who attend social/movie nights at other venues or schools must comply with the above directions where applicable as well as those that pertain to the venue being visited.
12. This policy will be published in the school newsletter with the social/movie night notification.

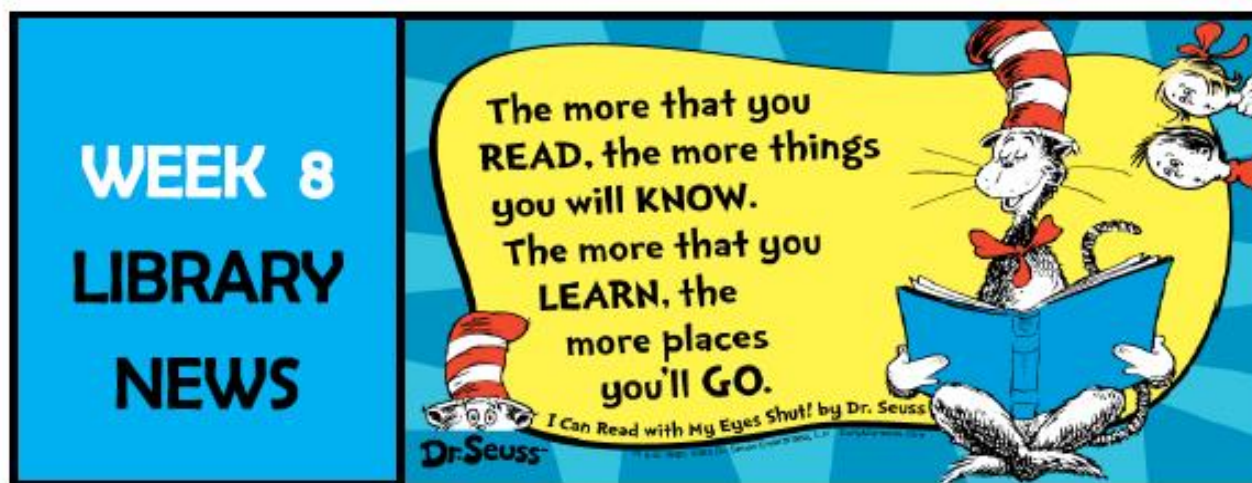

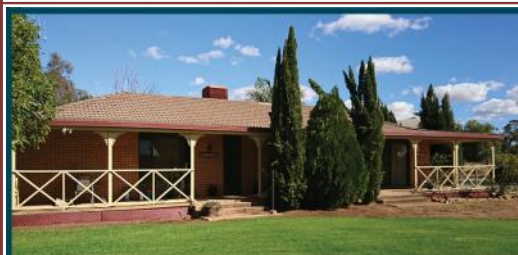
