Principal's Message

This week is the culmination of a very busy term. Monday is the 7/8 Dubbo Zoo excursion, 9/10 Food and PASS excursion Tuesday, Year 11 Metals recognition of our school. The theme this year is day at Trundle, Primary Scripture Service and Parent Teacher Interviews Wednesday. Thursday is our annual Cross Country and SRC Easter events. This week students are out of the school for different learning experiences, not available in Trundle. This school has to equip students to be global citizens as that is the world our children are mainstream because schools like ours lead the living in. This involves students having the confidence to look beyond the 60km sign and embrace different challenges.

Parent teacher interviews are an opportunity to reinforce the partnership between the school and the home. They are not an opportunity to take cheap shots at teachers. In my 31 years' service with the Department of Education I have never had the time, or the energy to dislike, or 'pick on' a student. Parents becoming involved in that sort of low-level thinking and accusations is in my opinion a failure to force themselves and their children to take responsibility for their learning or behaviour, or form a partnership with the school. In short, placing all the blame onto a school or teacher and not looking in the mirror, where part of the problem can often be found, is extremely counter-productive.

Last week, I spent time in the primary section of the school. The teaching and learning occurring across the three classes can only be described as exceptional. Long term readers of the newsletter will know that when negatives occur in this school, I am very open and honest with the community, so if I say it is exceptional, that is what an aging bald man, I find advertising shampoo it actually is! We set the bar very high and give the students the skills, support and confidence to jump. Some students find this environment challenging at times, but soon understand the culture of the school and thrive. Others are empowered, often by the family, to be passengers

academically and socially and leave this school to seek a less socially and academically accountable environment.

Our school has been asked to deliver the Key Note speech at the Primary Deputy Principal's Conference in Sydney. Over 200 schools send delegates and numerous others attend virtually. Considering there are 2071 primary schools in NSW, our school being asked to deliver the key note speech is an achievement and enormous Pastoral care and Leadership. We have also been asked to deliver a one-hour workshop of integrating pets as therapy into schools. Having pets in schools for students with anxiety related problems was considered a fad years ago when our first dog Ajax arrived, but now is very much way.

Public education is a pillar of social justice and equality because it provides equal opportunity for all. Jennifer Robinson should be a hero to every young girl. She grew up in the small town of Berry and attended Bomaderry High School. Jennifer is now an international human rights lawyer working on high profile cases such as Julian Assange. The daughter of a small-town race horse trainer, the silver spoon did not wedge open doors for her, a quality public school education and hard work did! She is now giving back to public education as she understands the gifts it gave her to succeed. Ironically, her Year 7 English teacher told her not to aim high. You will only be disappointed. She is the sort of role model for young girls, not pop singers or sports people. She obviously survived the incredible emotional damage Dr Seuss books can cause to young minds and thankfully did not watch mind altering cartoons.

Our world seems obsessed with sanitising our culture. If we look hard enough we will always find something offensive. A Vegan can find linking lamb to being a true Aussie in advertising offensive. As offensive, especially when one bottle is a year's supply for some. I hope in the rush to find offense with everything in our society does not lose sight of the big picture. I find children living in abusive families and the lack of support services offensive, I find the growing disparity in opportunity

between the city and the country offensive and our almost cultural acceptance of domestic violence. Maybe I am just out of touch and been influenced by Dr Seuss.

The media is very good at highlighting the negatives that occur in public schools. Chris Harris from the Telegraph who I know personally and seems a fine person, wrote an article about an increase in violence in public schools. He is unfortunately a puppet of a media industry that sensationalises issues to sell print and air time. The article did not mention better reporting systems increasing the statistics and increased transparency in public schools or the majority of knives taken to school are for children cutting fruit, but they are still reported as weapons. Private or religious based schools do not report to the same extent as public so they have a very big carpet where they can hide their issues and challenges. Always remember that when reading about public education.

The Trundle Progress Association does amazing work and has a definite passion for the community. They are asking for letters of support for an outdoor gym in Berryman Park. I think this is a wonderful idea and will be a community asset. The template and address for letters is in this newsletter.

students and hopefully a few more after Easter.
