Principal's Message

Last week was our annual swimming carnival. The day was an outstanding success because of the excellent organisation of Mrs Morgan and the enthusiasm and cooperation of our students. Our students were outstanding, as we expect and demand them to be. Indeed, the attendance rate at the carnival was over 90% across the school and participation was exceptional. Both are at levels other schools would see as an aspiration goal. At Trundle Central School however, it is an expectation. I thank Bruce and Mary Anne Flavel for the canteen, Parkes Shire for providing such an excellent facility and Trundle staff for their professionalism.

All students have started school well, settling quickly into positive work patterns and following our behavioural expectations. I am especially pleased with the transition students have made to Kindergarten and Year 7. This year we have seven Kinder students and eleven in Year 7. The red carpet is ready for more, but this is a solid building block for the future.

School data indicates we improved in every area in 2020, but I expect even better in 2021. We must have the mindset that we can do better each year, achieving at the same level or reflecting on the past, is not good enough. This is the St George Rugby League Club mindset, reflecting on the past premierships, rather than true analysis of the dismal performance of recent years. Talk to any supporter, they will tell you about the number of premierships in a row but are vague on when they won their last one. This cannot translate into improved performance on the field.

Positive news does not even make the gossip train, but negatives are in the first-class carriage, so we do not expect a pat on the back. However, the facts confirm, this town is blessed with an outstanding, comprehensive public school. The school numbers are currently 108 students with a

strong possibility of a few more in the near future. This maintains our 2020 numbers, but is still down on our pre-drought levels of 126 students across the school. Unless this changes, we will have staffing adjustments in the future. I ask people to positively promote the town, especially the fact you do not need three generations in the cemetery to be accepted as a local and valued. We need new families to maintain our quality of life and the vitality of the town.

This school provides an excellent product for the community. However, we cannot provide students with a place to hide socially, academically or terms of behaviour. If your children attend this school, they will be known to all staff and cared for. Social and learning problems will be identified. This creates a challenge to some students and families because with identification comes acknowledgement and responsibility. In my career, I have had many examples where parents have moved children because schools have identified learning deficits or behavioural difficulties. In addition, when mandatory reporters such as schools contact DOCS following student disclosures, the response is to move schools, rather than acknowledge the problem. I will never apologise for my passionate belief that I have a massive duty of care to children, not adults. At times, this offends people but it is not my job to be popular.

The school is currently developing our three strategic goals for 2021-2024 School Plan. These goals are the improvements the school hopes to achieve between the years 2021 to 2024. Our three strategic goals are:

Student growth and achievement.

Success in this will involve:

- Providing students in years 10,11,12 to skills, knowledge and confidence to clearly articulate their learning and career goals.
- Increase the number of Aboriginal students in the top three bands of the Higher School Certificate.
- Improve the school attendance rate to 92% of students attending every day for full days.
- 21% of students achieving within the top two bands of NAPLAN.

2. Engagement and communication, positive community partnerships and pastoral care.

Success in this area will involve:

- A 20% increase in the number of parents / carers actively engaged in and supporting the school's educational priorities through meaningful school partnerships.
- A 20% increase in parents attending school community events, including P&C meetings.
- A 20% increase in parent use of formal and informal communication practices.
- Year on year improvement in the 'Tell them from me', parent and student survey data.
- An increase in opportunities to recognise all student achievement.

3. High impact professional learning and quality curriculum delivery through the Western Access Program.

Success in this area will involve;

- Students will be provided with learning opportunities that extend, enrich and improve learning outcomes.
- Collaboration within and across schools will result in improved curriculum and pastoral care opportunities for students.
- Improvement in HSC results across all subjects.
- Improvement in the provision of information to students about post school opportunities,

Plans are not set in stone. Each week, I plan to win Powerball but it does not happen, it is an aspirational goal. Our plans will be constantly reviewed and modified to the contextual

environment of the school. That is a long way of saying, if we need to change we will do so. I will be undertaking staff and community consultation this term in regards to our plan. If you are contacted, I will ask you to think of the big picture of improving education across the whole community.

What is Otitis Media?


Dear Parent/Caregiver

Recently your child participated in the 'Healthy Ears' lessons

A major focus of the show was to teach the children the importance of blowing their blocked nose, one nostril at a time, to help them hear well.

Ear = an active infection in the middle ear with an infection inflamed eardrum, often with fever and pain. VERY common in toddlers.

Medical name: Acute Otitis Media.

'<u>Pusy Ear'</u> = a hole in the ear drum with continuing pus from the middle ear. Medical name; Suppurative Otitis Media


Glue Ear = fluid in the middle ear with an eardrum that is **not** inflamed. This can last for <u>several months</u>, and often there is little discomfort and no fever. It has <u>hidden</u> <u>hearing</u> loss and often <u>behaviour issues</u>.

Glue ear is the **most** common of all ear infections BUT is the **least** commonly diagnosed due to lack of hearing

regular testing. Medical name; Otitis Media with Effusion

Why is nose blowing important to your child's hearing?

- For children aged 4-9 yrs with speech, learning, behaviour or hearing problems, best practice is to have hearing testing every 3-4 months as fluid or glue in the middle ear can take up to 3 months to subside.
- Fluid or glue in the middle ear can take up to 3 months to subside
- In many cases a lack of regular nose blowing added to an immature eustachian tube (see below)
 is the main cause of ear problems.
- Sickness from cold / flu's as well as hay fever / seasonal allergies further increases this risk.



- The Eustachian tube leads from the back of your nose to your middle ear.
- The adult's Eustachian tube is <u>sloping and</u> <u>longer</u> which allows fluid to drain naturally.
- Children up until the age of 8-9 years old have horizontal tubes that don't allow for natural drainage.

This is why nose blowing is important.

Having **regular** ear health and hearing checks is important to help monitor your child's overall hearing health. Up until the eustachian tube fully develops (8-9 yrs) children can have a good hearing test one week and the following week may show signs of poor middle ear health and hearing loss.

How do I know if my child has otitis media?

Because otitis media can be <u>fluctuating</u> and may have no obvious outward signs, it can often be difficult to identify- especially GLUE EAR as it has no obvious medical signs like ear pus.

However, there are some things to look for which may indicate otitis media;

BEHAVIOUR

- Short concentration span and often stares out the window going into own 'little world' a lot.
- Says 'what' a lot.
- 'Off task' and may be reluctant to participate in activities.
- Disrupts others and copies others behaviour.
- Very noisy and can be frustrated-bursts of aggression.
- · Disobedient/ doing the wrong thing / doing their own thing / doing nothing!
- Frustration, anxiety and avoidance As a general rule, people with hearing loss tend to experience
 more frustration and anxiety than other people do, in comparable situations.

SPEECH AND LANGUAGE

- · Speech maybe unclear- have to ask the child to repeat
- Child may be reluctant to chat and have an overly loud or soft voice
- Language is slow to develop see chart



GENERAL HEALTH AND WELL BEING

- Sore, red or runny ears (although children who have had constant ear problems become immune to the pain as they think it is normal, so often won't complain)
- Sensitive to loud noise and be upset by loud group work
- Poor balance or seem uncoordinated
- Unhappy at school. May lack confidence, be quiet and withdrawn
- May have frequent colds and a frequent/constant runny nose
- May appear to have blocked nose and breathe through their mouth. A good trick;
 - get your child eat and keep their mouth shut when eating. Those who can't keep their mouth shut have blocked eustachian tubes. Mouth breathers often have glue ear.

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
