Principal's Message

This week is the Western Access Program (WAP) Study days. These days involve students travelling to other WAP schools for intensive face to face sessions with their coordinating teachers. The additional benefit of these days is, students establish or reinforce peer networks that are helpful especially during times of stress or poor motivation. This is especially important in Year 12 as lost time often translates into poor results. A third benefit that cannot be under-estimated is the chance for students to socialise. The opportunity for young people to form 'special relationships' can be limited in small towns such as Trundle. I believe it is important for students to have the opportunity to meet other people as this is an important part of adolescence.

An indication that this school is providing a contextually appropriate education is our very low absentee rate. To date, 97 of our 106 students have not missed a day of school. A further 7 have only had one day absent and unfortunately 2 are having an absolute shocker. Our attendance rate is a credit to our parents and the school. It is also a pleasure to walk around classrooms and witness the excellent behaviour and effort of our students. Occasionally, students come to this school with poor attendance and behaviour records. Most of these students quickly change the negative behaviours because not only the teachers expect them to maintain a high standard, the students do as well.

This week is Gobondery-NARRAF swimming in Warren. I wonder if South Sydney bunnies could play the Forestville Ferrets in Warren, as an exhibition game. This would be an outstanding promotion for Rugby League and an excellent late-night ABC documentary. I congratulate our swimmers for gaining selection and remind them, it is a 50m pool, so keep going, the wall will come. Well done, to all the students who are training in the afternoon to improve their times. Just remember to have fun, as first prize is not a sheep station.

Last week, our SRC elections were conducted. The SRC is an important link between the students and the management of the school. The NSW Department of Education is one of the biggest corporate entities in the world, with 3200 schools across a vast geographical area. Because of the size of the department, it is very important that we provide students with a mechanism for individual voice through the Student Representative Council. This year I have decided to allocate \$10,000 to the SRC for a student created and managed project. This project needs to be sustainable and benefit students across the whole school for many years to come. Students managing this project will quickly realise that outside tradesmen only quote in multiples of a hundred and Trundle is a million kilometres away, unless they have two jobs in the town at once, so there will be challenges. That is the whole idea of the exercise!

Our sign has malfunctioned and is not worth repairing. We are currently obtaining quotes for a new sign. My mantra is always going better when replacing equipment. To me, replacing the sign with one the same is a form of failure. A new sign will be operational shortly. When we first placed the sign on the corner, I was warned of mass traffic carnage because people would be distracted. To date, a magpie has flown into the sign and several ants have been permanently blinded by the flashing LED lights. I suspect this collateral damage is sustainable and we will go ahead with replacing the sign.

Australia has had 28 years of positive economic growth. Indeed, even in COVID turmoil the real-estate market continues to make paper millionaires, especially in major cities. However, I passionately believe, our ability or willingness as a society to protect and nurture children has declined over my 30-year career in education, despite our increased wealth as a nation. Every day I see families in crisis, as do all principals. Even those who are not allowed, or too afraid to acknowledge the problem, for fear the veneer of perceived elitism may be scraped off to reveal their schools are too, a reflection of society's challenges.

The result is neglected, abused children trying to survive the failings of adults and unfortunately inter-generational neglect. Inter-generational neglect

occurs because children start to believe the level of dysfunctionality in the home is normal and pass this on to their children.

Over the last 10 years in particular, across many communities, I have witnessed an increase in families where alcohol, cigarettes and/or drugs become as important, or more, than feeding children. All communities have families in crisis and adult support services are vital as well, but children's voices are not being heard in many rural communities. Our support services are over worked and ineffective because of flawed operational models, and at times they are non-existent. In my experience, the people working at these agencies are exceptional, but the level of the problem is exceeding their capacity. It takes a community to raise a child and I appeal to the community to support schools across the country and these agencies by reporting neglected or abused children. The best number is 132111. The small piece of information you provide, could be the chance for a child to break the cycle of abuse. This is a confidential service.

Speaking out makes me un-popular and accused of being arrogant and judgemental. This is for others to decide, but I cannot be quiet when I know children in all communities are going hungry, abused and neglected. If you are offended by this principal's message, feel free to complain, however I believe this issue needs to be spoken about.

Thank you to Trundle Services Club for returning to sponsor our Breakfast Club. Most of the children who attend are just receiving a brain power top up after a long bus trip but some are genuinely hungry. It is pleasing to see the club giving back to the community.

What is Otitis Media?



Dear Parent/Caregiver

Recently your child participated in the 'Healthy Ears' lessons. **A major focus** of the show was to teach the children the importance of blowing their blocked nose, one nostril at a time, to help them **hear well**.

Ear infection = an active infection in the middle ear with an inflamed eardrum, often with fever and pain. VERY common in toddlers.
 Medical name; Acute Otitis Media.


'Pusy Ear' = a hole in the ear drum with continuing pus from the middle ear. Medical name; Suppurative Otitis Media

Glue Ear = fluid in the middle ear with an eardrum that is **not** inflamed. This can last for **several months**, and often there is little discomfort and no fever. It has **hidden hearing loss** and often **behaviour issues**.

Glue ear is the **most** common of all ear infections BUT is the **least** commonly diagnosed due to lack of regular hearing testing. Medical name; Otitis Media with Effusion

Why is nose blowing important to your child's hearing?

- For children aged 4-9 yrs with speech, learning, behaviour or hearing problems, best practice is to have hearing testing every 3-4 months as fluid or glue in the middle ear can take up to 3 months to subside.
- Fluid or glue in the middle ear can take up to 3 months to subside
- In many cases a lack of regular nose blowing added to an immature eustachian tube (see below) is the main cause of ear problems.
- **Sickness from cold / flu's as well as hay fever / seasonal allergies further increases this risk.**



- **The Eustachian tube** leads from the back of your nose to your middle ear.
- The adult's Eustachian tube is *sloping and longer* which allows fluid to drain naturally.
- Children up until the age of 8-9 years old have horizontal tubes that **don't** allow for natural drainage.
This is why nose blowing is important.

Having **regular** ear health and hearing checks is important to help monitor your child's overall hearing health. Up until the eustachian tube fully develops (8-9 yrs) children can have a good hearing test one week and the following week may show signs of poor middle ear health and hearing loss.

How do I know if my child has otitis media?

Because otitis media can be **fluctuating** and may have no obvious outward signs, it can often be difficult to identify- especially **GLUE EAR** as it has no obvious medical signs like ear pus.

However, there are some things to look for which may indicate otitis media;

BEHAVIOUR

- Short concentration span and often stares out the window going into own 'little world' a lot.
- Says 'what' a lot.
- 'Off task' and may be reluctant to participate in activities.
- Disrupts others and copies others behaviour.
- Very noisy and can be frustrated- bursts of aggression.
- Disobedient/ doing the wrong thing / doing their own thing / doing nothing!
- Frustration, anxiety and avoidance - As a general rule, people with hearing loss tend to experience more frustration and anxiety than other people do, in comparable situations.

SPEECH AND LANGUAGE

- Speech maybe unclear- have to ask the child to repeat
- Child may be reluctant to chat and have an overly loud or soft voice
- Language is slow to develop see chart →


3 years - p, b, m, w, t, d, n, k, g, h, y

4½ years - s, z, sh, ch, l, j, f

8½ years - v, th, r, blends (e.g. tr, pl)

GENERAL HEALTH AND WELL BEING

- Sore, red or runny ears (although children who have had constant ear problems become immune to the pain as they think it is normal, so often won't complain)
- Sensitive to loud noise and be upset by loud group work
- Poor balance or seem uncoordinated
- Unhappy at school. May lack confidence, be quiet and withdrawn
- May have **frequent** colds and a **frequent/constant** runny nose
- May appear to have blocked nose and breathe through their mouth. **A good trick;**
 - o get your child eat and keep their mouth shut when eating. Those who can't keep their mouth shut have blocked eustachian tubes. Mouth breathers often have glue ear.




HISTORY CLUB
