Principal's Message

This week marks the end of a highly successful term two. However, there is no coasting into the term break at this outstanding public school. Monday semester one reports are posted and Tuesday, Year 5/6 STEM day at Peak Hill, Wednesday is Secondary Reward Trip and Thursday Industrial Action.

This school has a culture of always offering a wide variety of experiences outside the classroom. The reason is simple. I believe schools have a responsibility of assisting families with the social, moral, and physical development of children as well as the traditional academic pathways. This usually occurs outside the core curriculum and traditional classroom environment. People have the right to choose educational models and home schooling can be an option in extreme cases of need, but it cannot be a first option in my opinion. As an experienced public-school educator, I believe it is a narrow, vastly inferior model of education. Children need to learn to interact within a society, with people who are different morally, spiritually and in terms of race and sexuality. This is how they learn where they fit within the wider society. Education is providing choice and multiple perspectives, not indoctrination around a narrow view or perspective on the world.

The HSC is undergoing change which I believe will be very positive. Currently, students who want an ATAR (University entrance ranking) can only study one vocationally based subject, for example Construction. If the voice of educational policy, the Telegraph, can be believed students in the future can study multiple vocationally based subjects and still receive a university entrance ranking. Common sense just became more common! I do not know where schools will obtain the extra teachers, but this is a very positive move for the future.

One of the many pleasures of my job is to read student reports. This process reinforces my belief of the outstanding quality of students attending this school. Young people are often portrayed, especially in the commercial media, as being out of control, but I believe that is far from reality. The outstanding young people that attend this school are an absolute credit to their parents, this community and school.

In over 34 years in education I have learnt that the key to managing young people is consistency, structure, high standards / expectations and building positive relationships. Young people need to be taught to display positive behaviours; it will not occur through magic. Schools and families are primarily responsible for this education. Young people, especially teenagers, will always test the boundaries. This is part of the maturation process. As parents and educators, it is our job to understand this process, but also maintain the line of what is acceptable. If you want to be popular, buy a Labrador, if you want to be a parent or educator, be prepared to be unpopular at times but maintain a standard.

I thank Adam Hall from the Trundle Boomers for agreeing on running a training session for our U16 football players today, even though it had to be cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances. I am a supporter of team sport and I believe Trundle Boomers are a genuine community asset. Contact sport in schools is under pressure because it comes with a degree of inherent risk. However, I firmly believe the advantages for our children far exceed the degree of risk. It is disappointing to me, the way our society has become so risk adverse. Sure, we need to plan to reduce risk, but many activities are being placed in the too hard basket because something may happen. News flash, if your children play sport, they will eventually be injured, they ride motorcycles, they will fall off, interact in society they will encounter a variety of people, and some will be idiots. There is an all-encompassing word to describe this, it is called life.

On Thursday last week, our school and St Patricks combined for a Soccer game. This was a non-competitive enjoyable occasion for students from both schools. I thank St Patricks for the opportunity for both schools to come together. Contrary to some people's belief our two schools have a very strong working relationship with our main focus being maintaining and improving education in Trundle.

Attendance is a continual focus at our school. Congratulations to Hailey Bolam who at the end of the attendance data period had a 100% attendance rate for the semester. Another student attended 100% of time but we can not publish their name. This is an outstanding achievement! Ironically, on the day I was going to hand out the Principal's Award, they were both absent sick. The world can be a funny place. Our school overall attendance rate is 90% which is above both regional and state average. Indeed, 80.6% of our students attend school at a level above the state average. The obvious question is, why then our overall attendance rate is not

higher. Unfortunately, in a relatively small sample, a student with poor attendance more adversely affects the result.

Last week was our Newcastle excursion. This excursion was postponed from last year. Many tired students and staff arrived back on Friday but from all reports an outstanding time was had by all. These events are vital life experiences and socialisation opportunities for students. There is a world beyond the boundaries of Trundle and I am determined that our students will have the experience, confidence, and attitude to seek it out. Looking at the Facebook posts, excursions have really changed since my time at St Philomena's Catholic school for the biologically Catholic. Our school went to a prayer retreat at the Warrumbungle's National Park in High School, not the exciting activities our secondary students experienced.

The renovation of our playground equipment area is proceeding well. Our students have been amazing in keeping away from the work area to let the men quickly and safely complete the task. The comment of the week goes to Beau Longhurst when he looked at the road base foundation and correctly stated that it does not look like soft fall to him. The new construction is a base of consolidated gravel, layer of compressed foam and layer of synthetic grass. The new design takes away the trip hazards that have been responsible for many skinned knees and elbows over the years.


Congratulations to the committee and management of the Trundle Children's Centre. The focus on school readiness will be an asset to both schools in town. Research is very clear on the need for structured early childhood learning to prepare young people for big school. The centre is an asset to the town and should be promoted as a reason to move to Trundle. Unfortunately, with the current unavailability of suitable rentals, new residents will need to bring the house as well. There is an idea, the Parkes Council could develop residential blocks in the town to encourage new residents.

Recently, the Greens Leader Adam Bandt, refused to have a press conference in front of the Australian flag. This is in my very humble opinion a disgrace. I believe the flag needs to change as the Union Jack is a symbol of a

past Australia. However, it is our current flag and a symbol of our freedom, security, and the prosperity this country provides us. My question to Mr Bandt is, as educators, how are we meant to encourage young people to respect and cherish this country, if our elected representatives are refusing to acknowledge the most recognisable symbol of this great country. Warren Mundine, a respected Aboriginal elder, has described this behaviour as idiotic. It is not my place to label this behaviour except to say Warren Mundine is an exceptional human and a great judge of character.

The right to strike is part of every healthy democracy. On Thursday 30th of June, members of both the NSW Teachers Federation and the Independent Schools Association will strike for 24hrs. This is un-precedented action, as I believe both organisations have not taken this combined industrial action previously. Our school will have no teaching staff on site on Thursday and will not be operational (closed).

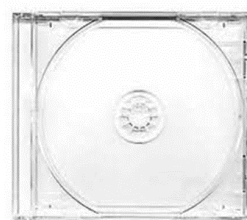

Secondary students in Art Interest Elective have been working on painting artworks for the Trundle Children's Centre. We can't wait to see the end result!

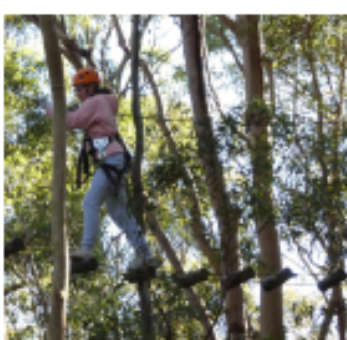


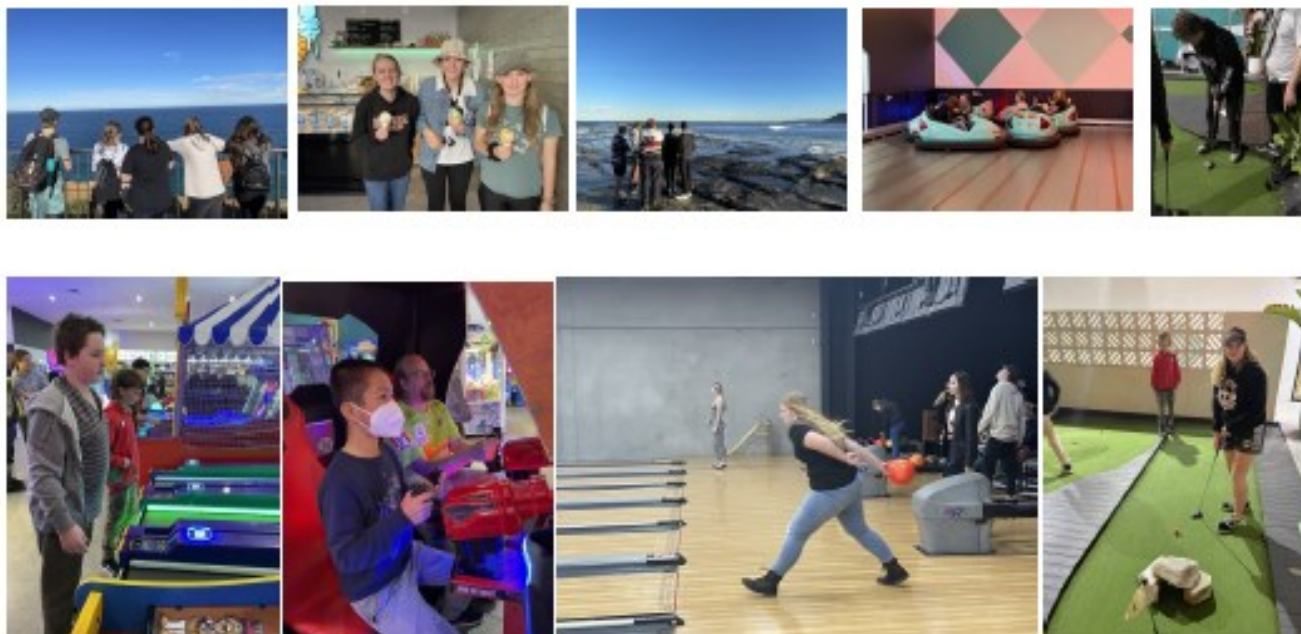
Secondary Major Excursion

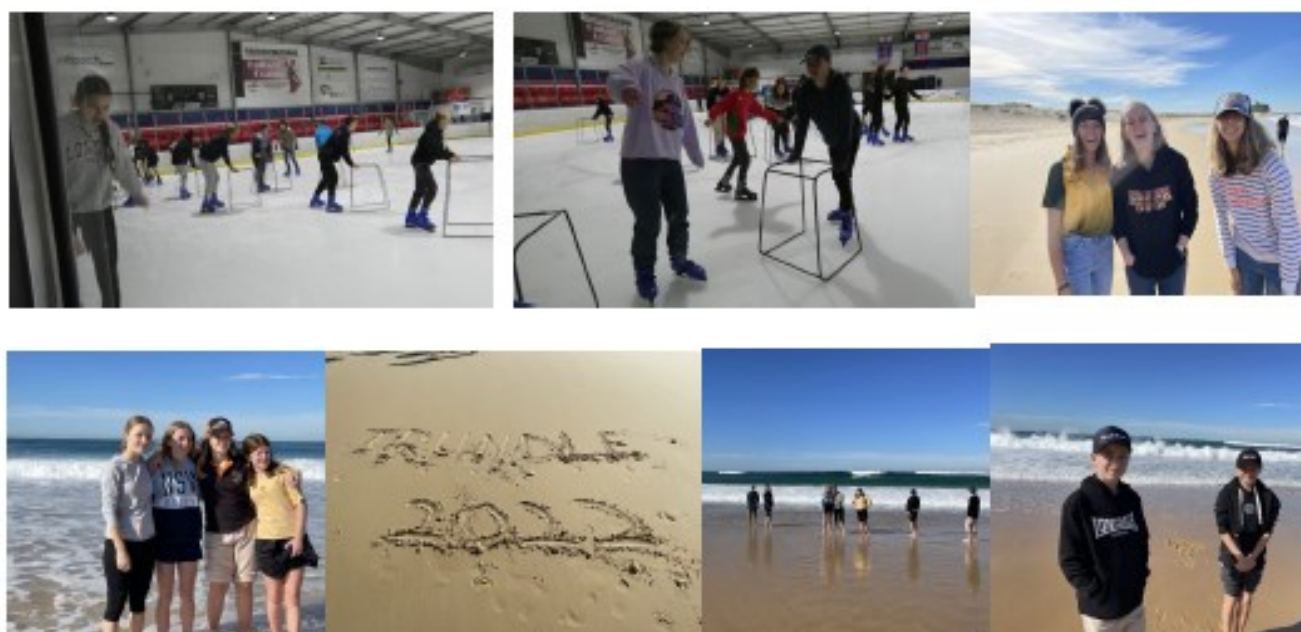

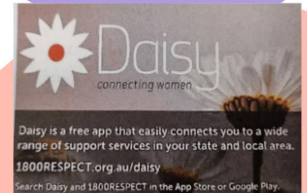

The new Western Cancer Centre draws patients and their families from high population centres north, south, east and west of Dubbo (for the PET CT scanner there is nothing available west of the Blue Mountains). These new services are delivering life-saving care much closer to home, with a strong intention to make sure patients could be better supported by their loved ones while undertaking treatment.

Macquarie Home Stay has been established for one purpose - to provide patients and their partner or carer with accommodation while preparing for or post treatment at Dubbo Hospital.

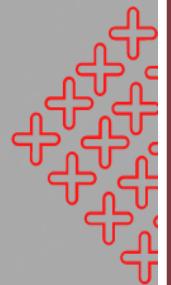
