Principal's Message

This week is the White Card course Tuesday, Secondary Welfare lunch, History movie afternoon, Primary games afternoon Wednesday, PSSA Swimming Thursday and Friday at Homebush in Sydney, Cross Country and SRC activities Friday. A very busy week to end another term at this outstanding public school.

Emma Rippon, Year 10, is an outstanding young person and a talented cricketer. I do not usually highlight individuals in this forum, but Emma deserves recognition. Emma has natural talent but most importantly shows commitment and determination. She came to us from the Popes care at Red Bend Catholic College. I thought Emma could struggle in a boutique school such as ours but have thankfully been proven very wrong. She is travelling to India to play cricket this month and is currently away representing the combined high schools in the under 15 girls cricket side against combined Catholic and independent schools. Last week I spoke to the whole school about how students attending excursions such as the Royal Easter Show is an achievement every student should be proud of. Consider this, if the behaviour and effort of all students is not of a high standard, staff do not have the good will to give up their time to organise and supervise excursions. It is a simple equation, get the small things right and they add up to big rewards. Miss Earney deserves to be congratulated for embracing the opportunity to take students to the show through entering the All Roads to the Easter Show competition. The executive of this school also need recognition for creating the culture within the school that allows staff to be informed risk takers and grasp opportunity.

The secondary major excursion is planned for August. Yes, I can hear the various tables of knowledge saying the students are never at school. Extra-curricular activities improve academic results, research confirms this. Also, this school has a goal of producing well rounded, socially aware, and tolerant students. To achieve this, they must travel outside the boundaries of Trundle to experience many different lifestyles and cultures. Our students should not fear cultural diversity and need to be challenged by moving outside their social and geographic comfort zones. When I arrived at this school, a year 9 student told me he is never leaving Trundle. I asked him where he had been previously, he said regularly to Parkes and Orange for the day. This conversation made me determined to unlock opportunity for our students through extracurricular events. There is absolutely nothing wrong with living in Trundle, I have been here 10 years and will be for many more. The problem occurs when our students do not know or understand what is beyond the 50-kilometre signs. This generates fear and in some extreme cases, an irrational hate of racial and sexual diversity. Technology has contributed amazing things to our society. I sometimes wonder where it will end. If we believe the late Steve Jobs co-founder of Apple Inc, the limit is our imagination. Technology has also created significant challenges in society and therefore schools. I can see a time when we return to on paper supervised assessments because software programs such as Grammarly and Artificial Intelligence have corrupted the assessments. Even Blind Freddy and his mate Dumb Dale are aware of the massive cheating which is occurring in formal assessments and job applications across the whole country. Unfortunately, at this stage the checking mechanisms are lagging well behind the software and artificial intelligence. The HSC exam will moderate itself because 50% is written under exam conditions, but I wonder how many absolute muppets obtain job interviews courtesy of smart software. Readers do not need to worry about the principal's message it is completed by two fingers

typing and a misguided sense of self-importance.

Another problem is young people lacking social and communication skills because technology has allowed them to isolate in a virtual world. I especially see the problem in young boys. Some boys lack purpose and identity because the internet throws up so many conflicting ideas and images. They struggle to regulate emotions and behaviour; some are de-sensitised to violence and have misguided ideas of appropriate sexual behaviour. Recent research on the effects of pornography on young males indicates over half of males 9-16 can regularly access pornographic images through the internet. Regular viewing of pornography increases the chance of early inappropriate and unsafe sexual encounters. It is also believed to strengthen the chance of a young male being involved in sexual violence. I have written countless times in this forum. Parents need to regulate what their children are watching on the internet. It is your house, and you most likely purchased the phone and pay for the internet. Hard for a child to argue who is in control in your house. The major platforms will not remove dangerous content, so we must! Children also should not have televisions or computers in their room. The research is very clear about the emitted blue light from electronic devices increasing the incidences of poor mental health.

A greater number of traumatised children as a direct result of relationship breakdown is also a feature of modern society and therefore schools. Many times, adults are asked about the trauma associated with their relationship breakdown, but children are often forgotten. Childhood / teenage trauma is acted out in many ways. Some younger children regress back to baby talk because that is when they gained the most attention, others start to get in trouble at school often because this is a method of eventually telling another adult or parent they are suffering, older children can become involved in risk taking behaviour or selfharm. Research indicates self-harm such as cutting, and friction burning is not solely for attention seeking but the sight of blood releases some of the internal pain the young person is suffering. What ever the function of deliberate harm, it is becoming more common, especially in my observation for young girls.

I am not an expert of parenting, nobody is. It is the hardest job any person will ever do and there is absolutely no correct method. However, 34 years of working in education has allowed me to know:

- Separated parents should never criticise former partners in front of children. Your children do not have your level of anger towards your former partner, they have unconditional love. Indeed, they will personalise the comments as a reflection of themselves. For example, if my dad is a useless, violent man, he is my father, so that is what I will become.
- It does not matter what age children are they will suffer during relationship break down. It is a myth that waiting until children are older is better.

The balance is always staying in a poor relationship is not a good situation for children either. However, the damage separation does to children is in the hands of adults.

What is it?

WRAS, in partnership with Underwriting Agencies Australia (UAA), is again hosting a Talent Identification Day for young athletes of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island descent.

What is Involved?

The day will provide a platform for athletes to engage in and demonstrate their abilities in the presented sports. The sport-stations will include a combination of skill-based and game based activities designed to provide a welcoming and fun environment for the athletes to interact in. The coaches present are all highly qualified and have significant experience in talent identification.

After the talent ID Day, students that have been identified will be asked to participate in 2 further training events to be hosted by WRAS. There will be one session in June and one in July. The sessions will focus on holistic athlete development in a field-based and a gym-based setting. At the conclusion of these 2 follow up sessions, athletes may either be offered a WRAS Future Stars Scholarship and/or invited to the appropriate WRAS-program trial for the 2024-2025 season.
