Principal's Message

This week is Country Women's Association Public Speaking in Condobolin.

On Thursday last week, we received the wonderful news that our appeal against the immediate loss of 2.3 teaching staff was successful. This guarantees these highly skilled professional people will be working at our school at least to the end of the 2024 school year. I appealed the original decision on three grounds. One, the effect this unexpected reduction in staff has upon the education and welfare of the students placed in our care. Students who already suffer a high degree of geographical disadvantage. Two, the financial hardship it forces upon the teachers involved and the loss of consistent government income for the town. Three, the reputational damage public education would suffer considering these outstanding people have contracts until the end of the calendar year. There was a fourth reason that the decision was just plain wrong, and I was angry (another word starting with p would be appropriate here as well). My energy until the end of the year will be focused on retaining these exceptional people for the 2025 school year and beyond. Many people told me I was wasting my time appealing, but I need to try every possible avenue to support my staff and the students who attend this school.

The battle to retain staff may be won for the short term. However, the harsh reality is to maintain the current staffing of employment in Bogan Gate, Trundle, and Tullamore, we need young families to move to these townships. This is not happening at all, or fast enough. All these towns show signs of past prosperity based around a labour intensive agricultural and commercial model of operation that does not exist anymore. Just drive around and see the number of vacant houses on farms and you will realise the extent of the population decline. I believe the three schools will eventually have to partially merge to maintain the quality and viability of education in this area. This statement often creates anger and denial. Always remember when the Ostrich places its head in the sand a very tender part of its body is still exposed. Action is needed to save our towns.

All NSW public schools have lost operational funding and retained funds. We were in a better position than

many in terms of giving back retained funds because we have a policy of spending the money available on the students currently at the school. Our exceptional modern facilities reflect this policy. However, the recent change in government policy could remove as much as 100,000 dollars from the school's operational budget over the next two years. Already we have had to change our fee structure for school buses, and I fear more changes will occur next year. Any increase in costs disproportionately affects students from lowincome families. I cannot accept this situation and have already written letters trying to secure more thirdparty sponsorship for our school. The community does not need to worry, we are well below the salary cap when private and religion-based schools are compared. Sort of like the Roosters compared to Tigers or Sharks in the NRL.

The NSW government held a community cabinet meeting in Orange last Friday. I was lucky enough to be invited to meet with the Education Minister, Hon. Prue Car for a 15-minute private discussion about local issues in education. Well, almost private, Ms Car, her advisor, media and security person and me. About as private as you would expect. Again, many people told me I was wasting my time. It is OK, every new day gives you back time. Later, I had an opportunity to talk to the Premier, Hon. Chris Minns at the same event. Topics discussed with both people were lack of early intervention services, staffing and domestic violence prevention. I completely understand that these powerful people may be simply ticking a box or throwing some oil at the squeaky wheel but the more times you try the better chance of success. It was speed dating politician style.

Ms Car and Mr Minns appeared genuinely interested in the concept of establishing external hubs of early intervention professionals to service schools such as Trundle. The Minister for Education also gave a verbal commitment to visit our school in the future. I have no political affiliation; I treat each government with the same degree of cynicism. However, I also acknowledge this government and minister inherited the disgraceful inequities in service availability between city and rural areas, they did not create them. This year the Secretary of the Department (the biggest name badge there is) Murat Dizdar, also met with me. This degree of accessibility was not available with the last government, so that is a positive trend. I thank them for giving our school this opportunity.

Last week our relay team travelled to Sydney for the state swimming championships. The only problem is the roof of the stadium caught on fire and the day's events were cancelled. A long trip for a few moments of excitement but no swimming. I believe the fire was deliberately lit by competitors from other schools scared of the possible utter humiliation from the supreme athletes from Trundle. The other theory is defective solar panels. You choose which one is correct. Whilst not swimming is disappointing the roof catching fire and the evacuation will become a lifelong memory for these students.

Last week, our Athletics Carnival was conducted. There were some modifications to the program as the golf course was very wet. I was massively impressed with the encouragement students were giving their peers during the carnival. This indicates to me that our students have a healthy perspective about the value of sport. It should be fun, not a source of stress/anxiety for young people or an avenue for parents to gain some sort of weird boost to their fragile self-concept if their children win. News flash world, children are playing sport, not curing cancer. The best runner etc is not a better person, they just perform better than a few others on that day. Watching the senior High jump reminded me of my days at St Philomena's School in Moree for the chronically Catholic. I thank the boys for inviting me to compete to provide a role model and performance yardstick for the discipline of high jumping, but I cannot risk injury this close to the Masters Games in Paris.

Royal Far West visited our school last Tuesday. The clinicians conducted assessments as part of our involvement in the outreach program. Rebecca Hogan (nee Dray) was the speech pathologist on the team, a former student. Rebecca commented on the amazing grounds and facilities our students now enjoy at this school. This was wonderful to hear because I have this ordinary head from banging it up against many walls trying to improve access to facilities for country students. It is also very gratifying to see former students working for organisations such as Royal Far West which is dedicated to improving the lives of country students.

The official policy line in schools is, do not take sides in parental disputes. I can assure parents this is not correct at this school. I take the child's side because often in the heightened emotion of the separation, the child's voice is forgotten. If I believe the behaviour of parents is negatively impacting on the social/emotional or educational growth and well-being of a student, I will have no hesitation in reporting it to community services. Every person who works at this school is a

mandatory reporter. This modern trend of weaponizing children has to stop because the only long-term outcome is often permanent emotional damage to children.

The dangers of unsupervised internet use are a constant topic of this newsletter. Sitting near me at the community parliament was a man who had lost his teenage son to suicide. Discovered on the young person's phone were over 200 vile messages from bullies some of which were sent in the middle of the night. The home is not a haven with modern technology. The constant barrage of hate messages may have caused his son to take his life. These students were sending messages after 11 o'clock at night or accessing internet platforms which are largely unregulated. I am sure some Trundle students are as well. This could not be a positive in terms of their mental health, and ability to learn or function the next day. I will repeat again; you own/rent the house, so you can regulate or take the device. It just sometimes takes the difficult conversation.
